

GOVERNOR WALTON OUSTED BY SENATE

Ottawa, Oct. 23.—Governor J. C. Walton was suspended from office at 8:40 p.m. when the State Senate by a vote of 36 to 1 adopted a resolution temporarily relieving him of his official duties, following the submission by the Lower House of a bill of impeachment against him.

The impeachment bill charged the executive with entering into a "corrupt agreement" with Dr. A. E. Davenport, state health commissioner, to place T. P. Edwards, the Governor's personal chauffeur, on the payroll of the health department at \$200 a month; and that thereby "certain monies were diverted

EXPECT BIG CHOIR AT THE SERVICE

A massed choir of about 80 voices is expected to sing the service of evening in the Anglican church at Hampton Station on Wednesday evening. The choir is made up of representatives of most of the Anglican congregations in the Kingston deanery, which comprises the greater part of the counties of Kings and Queens. The training has been under the supervision of Douglas Baker, organist of St. Paul's church, Rochester. The sermon is to be by Ven. Archdeacon Crowfoot, of St. John. It was announced on Sunday in Hampton that the offering would be given to the N. B. Protestant Orphans' Home. A large attendance is expected. A committee of Hampton ladies is providing tea for the visiting choir.

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OFFERS EXPERT TO REPLANT TREES

Annapolis Royal, Oct. 23.—F. J. D. Barnum, Nova Scotia lumberman, has announced his engagement of O. Scherbeck, who has been chief forester with a Quebec firm, to act in an advisory capacity to Nova Scotia holders of timberlands and woodlots, who wish to make use of his services, especially with a view to replanting cut areas. Mr. Barnum plans to establish a nursery near Annapolis to carry on reforestation experiments.

C. T. S. BRANCH IS FORMED IN CITY

IS FOUND GUILTY OF WATERING MILK

A conviction on the charge of selling watered milk was obtained against Edmund Given yesterday afternoon when the case was tried in the court room in East St. John before Magistrate Adams. There were two cases with similar charges brought by the St. John Sub-District Board and the other case, that of Fred D. White, was not concluded. The hearing in Mr. White's case was adjourned and will be continued next Friday. Dr. J. Roy Campbell prosecuted on behalf of the Board of Health and there were present as representatives of the board Dr. William Warwick, T. M. Burns, secretary, and Inspector J. F. Tilley. Mr. Given and Mr. White were not represented by counsel, but it is understood that Mr. White will have legal representation when his case is taken up again. A fine of \$8 was imposed in Mr. Given's case.

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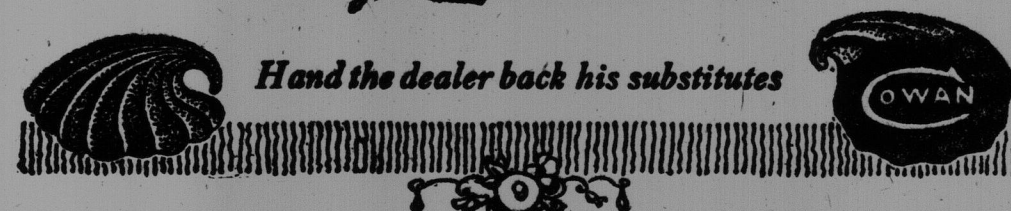
