Negotiations For Irish Peace Resumed In Downing Street Today

HALF HOUR SESSION IS FOLLOWED BY MEETING OF A COMMITTEE

London, Nov. 1—Peace negotiations between representatives of the British government and delegates of the Dail Eireann were resumed at No. 10 Downing street, the official home of the pre-

mier, this morning.

Michael Collins and Arthur Griffith, representing the Dail Eireann, arrived in Downing street at eleven o'clock, accompanied by Erskine Childers, secretary to the Sinn Fein delegation. It was said they were there in response to a message from Lloyd George.

The meeting lasted for thirty-five minutes, after which, it was said, another committee meeting was being held. The government representatives present were Lloyd Gorge, Austen Chamberlain and Lord Rivkenhead. Lord Birkenhead.


