Greenville, S. C., April 8—Mrs Fannie C. Scott, Greenville County's new Probate Judge, is the first woman to be chosen for an elective office by the voters of South Caroline. At a special election called by Gov. Cooper to fill the vacancy caused by the death in a recent automobile accident of Judge Walter M. Scott there was only one candidate—the widow of Judge Scott having no opposition.

For several years Mrs. Scott had acted as her husband's assistant in the Probate Judge's office and consequently is familiar with the work. She is thirty years old, one of the youngest Probate Judges—a post corresponding to that of Surrogate in New York—ever elected in South Caroline.

Rev. T. Hunter Boyd, secretary of the "Overseas Welcome," is responsible for the statement that "nearly half the population of Canada belongs to the non-Anglo-Saxon races."

Mr. Boyd, who is overseas representative of the Presbyterlan church of Canada, was present at the "Festival of Freedom," held last year at Prague, when the establishment of the Czecho-Slovakian Republic was celebrated. "All the fighting for freedom was not on the west front," Mr. Boyd said. "These people of central Europe have been contending for self-determination since the time of John Huss, who was not a German, but a Czech. John Huss was the first to pronounce the doctrine of self-determination, not President Wilson, as some seem to think."

In regard to the future of immigration from the Old Country, Mr. Boyd declared that everything would depend upon the action of the Canadian government. He believed there would be a big movement westward if the way was open, but at present immigration was restricted to workers on the land. He contended that Canadians should be specially interested in the newly emancipated people of Central Europe, as so many of our immigrants have come from these Slavic countries.
