Complaint re Vendors' Charges and Quality of Liquor

22.23 Chief Inspector Wilson Speaks of

Fredricton, Jan. 8—Chief Inspector W. D. Wilson appeared before the municipal council of York today and made a pica for the support of the prohibition act. for the support of the prohibition act. In response to complaints concerning ex-cessive prices charged by vendors for liquor and also concerning the inferior quality of liquor, he announced that he would advocate the establishment of a central government dispensary which would be able to control the price of liquor and also insure it as to quality. Dr. G. G. Melvin, chief health officer of the province, also appeared before the
