

HIGHER COAL OUTPUT



GANG MURDER IN CONEY CROWD

Man Shot Dead And Companion Wounded Three Times in Broad Day

Slayer Escapes on Train—Killing Follows Night in an East Side Wine Cellar And Early Taxi-cab Trip

(New York Times.)

While the police of the city were busy yesterday on the killing of two men last week as a result of a gang fight, another murder with all the earmarks of a gang feud took place at Coney Island, Joseph Cohen, a Manhattan straw hat manufacturer, living at Rockaway Park, was shot dead and his companion, Harry Korman, a furrier of 19 Clinton street, Manhattan, was shot three times as they were walking along West Twenty-second street, between Surf and Railroad avenues.

The assassin got away, but the police sent out a general alarm for him last night. There was so much resemblance between yesterday's shooting and the killing of "Rubber" Shaw, in Hoboken, last Thursday night, when he and Geo. Lewis were walking along a Hoboken street, as well as the killing of "Tanner" Smith in the Marginal Club in Eighth avenue, Manhattan, a week ago last Saturday night, that the police immediately connected up the three affairs. Later investigation convinced the authorities, however, that the Coney Island affair had no relation to the other gang killings.

Cohen, who has a place of business at 707 Broadway, New York, was walking along West Twenty-second street at 1:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon, with Korman and Matt Barron, a partner of the latter, when some one in the crowd drew a revolver and began shooting. One bullet went through Cohen's lung and he dropped dead. Korman was shot in the leg and twice in the body and is in the Coney Island Hospital in a serious condition. Barron disappeared after the shooting and the police were unable to find him. He is said to live near Stanton and Suffolk streets, Manhattan. Both men were walking along West Twenty-second street, between Surf and Railroad avenues, when the shooting was supposed to have done the shooting was seen to board a Manhattan bound train.

The police are also looking for a mysterious woman who was with Korman and Barron earlier in the day, and a taxi-cab driver who drove them to Coney Island after being hired at 5 o'clock yesterday morning at Eldridge and Houston streets, New York. Detectives questioned Korman at the hospital and he said the shooting was the outcome of a row which had started earlier in the day in a restaurant at Coney Island.

Had Been Out All Night. Korman said that he, Barron, a girl said to be a cabaret singer, and a musician who was known to him only as "Max" had met in a wine cellar, Manhattan, on Saturday night and early Sunday morning all had started for Coney Island in a taxi-cab. Arriving at the island the party went to a restaurant where a quarrel developed. Suddenly, Korman said, a stranger in the place seized a large carving knife from a table and drove one of them out of the restaurant. The girl and Max the musician, Korman said, returned to New York in a touring car, while he and Barron telephoned to Cohen and went to 28 North Beach street, Rockaway Park, to meet them at Coney Island. Cohen, he said, showed up at noon, and the three then went shooting along West Twenty-second street for the man who had driven them to dealers in Mexico City with the knife. While strolling along the street, he said, he heard revolver shots, and before he could look around was struck in the leg and the body.

E. M. Cohen, brother of the murdered man, and a partner in Cohen Brothers at 707 Broadway, who lives on Washington Heights, Manhattan, was questioned by the police. He admitted that his brother had had a quarrel with Barron and that the slain man was prosecuting Barron for extortion in connection with some labor troubles. After hours of work on the case the police were of the opinion that the killing was the result of a quarrel over the "mystery woman." They said they had information that the woman spent Friday and Saturday in the company of Barron and Korman, and that the Sunday trip was to be another day at the seaside until the quarrel developed. It was said that the police had located the driver of the taxi-cab, but that he was "out with a fare," and the detectives were waiting for him to return.

STRENGTH OF BRITAIN; RISE OF UNITED STATES

General Smuts Gives Impressions Gained at Peace Conference

London, Aug. 6.—(By the Associated Press)—Christian Smuts, British member of the League of Nations commission, in a speech at Cape Town yesterday, said the three greatest impressions he gained during the peace conference were, first, the immense preponderance of the British Empire in the world; second, the rising power of America, which was only great power to emerge from the war unscathed and even with resources vastly increased; third, the decline of old Europe not only relatively but intrinsically, owing to war exhaustion.

POLICE SERGEANT WOUNDED; CONSTABLE IS KILLED AT ENNISTIMON, IRELAND

Dublin, Aug. 5.—Sergeant Riordan and Constable Murphy were shot yesterday at Ennistimon, County Clare. Murphy was killed and Riordan dangerously wounded. James Ian MacPherson, chief secretary for Ireland, has wired the deepest sympathy of the Irish government with the relatives of Murphy, brutally murdered in loyal and courageous discharge of his duty.

RENEWED ACTIVITY IN SEARCH OF THE OPALS OF MEXICO

Queretaro, Mexico, July 19.—(Correspondence of Associated Press)—Opal mining in this district, an industry as yet untouched by foreign capital, has shown renewed activity with the closing of the war and a normal number of men will soon be at work. The Queretaro district for more than sixty years had furnished virtually all the opals sold in the republic, most of the valuable gems going to dealers in Mexico City who in turn ship them to the United States. Primitive methods are still used here to secure the gems. Dynamite is used to blast the gems from the ground. After the rock is broken into sizeable pieces it is taken to the shops for the grinding and polishing processes. Modern methods are not used, the rough stones merely being placed on spindles and applied to an ordinary grindstone worked by foot power. Vigorous rubbing on soft leather is the last step in completing the opal for the market.

KILLED BY SHELLS LEFT AT SCENES OF CONFLICT

Jerusalem, July 4.—(Correspondence Associated Press)—Many chitin shells and explosives which were scattered throughout the country during the open warfare between the Turks and the Allies. The battlefields cover such a large area that careful salvaging has been impossible, and the result is that children, farmers or peasant women are mangled almost every day by accidental explosions.

A large number of the cases treated in the American Red Cross surgical hospital here have been bomb or abdominal cases, according to the physician in charge. The hospital was operated for seven months, treating a total of 608 patients. In the various clinics
