### WINDOW GLASS DEARER.

(Hardware and Metal, March 8.)  
Announcement of prices adopted on binder twine for the season is in effect elsewhere in this issue and follows along predictions made in these columns last week. The opening of 28 1/2 c. for 500-foot lengths is 7 1/2 c. a pound higher than that set in April last year and is above quotation in force in the season. It is said that no difficulty will be experienced in taking care of requirements. A spectacular rise in the price of linseed oil has gone into effect and prices being quoted are 28 c. a gallon higher than the opening of 28 1/2 c. in the season. No quotations are being made whatever and the situation with regard to supplies is said to be serious. Some slight improvement is shown in the movement of freight generally, though the strike now existing in Toronto is holding up outgoing shipments and jobbers' warehouses are rapidly filling up with orders packed but no means of being shipped. Advances were not numerous during the week though changes in an upward direction were reported on certain stretchers, cotton duck belting, saw vises and tin roofing caps. Added strength in the tin and lead markets resulted in higher prices on solder. A very firm situation exists on wire nails and advances in cash cord would not be unexpected. Business is reported good.

People Take Advantage of Disorders and Capture Several Towns

Peking, Mar. 11.—Taking advantage of disorder in the province of Szechuen, the Tibetans have rebelled and are marching on Szechuen, where they have captured several towns. The force is estimated at 10,000 and is armed with modern rifles.

Tibet is controlled virtually by the natives, who are a branch of the Mongol race, the Chinese government looking after foreign relations and maintained
