Johnson, the general store of Lougheed Block, containing about \$100,000 worth of merchandise and the residence of James Mitchell were destroyed by fire. The total loss will amount to fully \$7,000.

Agent Lost Him His Seat... London, June 20.—(Canadian Press)—Charles F. G. Masterman, under secretary of state in the home office, was deprived of his seat in the house of commons for the north division of Westhampton and law courts, which found that his election was aided by corrupt practices on the part of his agent. The judge said he would not rest upon Masterman personally to remove his seat.
