Relief of Unemployed Also Will Be Taken Up

ALL QUIET AGAIN. At 8:15 this morning all quiet was reported from the Glace Bay police station, after the rioting last night, resulting in the pillaging and wrecking of six stores at Sterling and Dominion. Since Sunday night, when mob violence first broke out, following unemployment in certain of the gullery districts, eleven stores have been wrecked and emptied. This morning heavy stores in the area had been left untouched by the mob.

WILL PAY \$150,000. Litigation Between Piggy Wiggy Corporation and Clarence Saunders Settled

MEMPHIS, Jan. 5.—Settlement of all litigation pending between Clarence Saunders and the Piggy Wiggy Corporation, was announced last night, by attorneys representing Saunders and the corporation. Under the terms of the agreement, Saunders will pay the corporation \$150,000 within two years, and the corporation, in turn, will waive all claims against Saunders.

Former M. P. Named Acadia Principal. WOLFVILLE, N. S., Jan. 5.—Ernest W. Robinson, formerly member of parliament for Kings county, has received the appointment of acting principal of Acadia Collegiate Academy, Wolfville, for the remainder of the academic year, in succession to Dr. W. L. Archibald, who has been appointed registrar of Acadia University. Prior to entering politics, Mr. Robinson was inspector of schools for Kings and Hants counties.

White Conspirators Jailed In Ukraine. MOSCOW, Jan. 5.—Political police of the Ukraine today arrested a group of alleged "white" conspirators supposed to have been seeking to prepare the ground in the Crimea for a landing of "white" forces from Rumania. Police Chief Baltiuk asserted that the alleged plotters, mostly former officers of the Czarist Army attempted to wreck trains on which Soviet officials traveled.

TIDEWATER MEET WILL OPEN TODAY. Question of St. Lawrence Waterway Subject of St. Paul Conference

PAUL, Minn., Jan. 5.—Efforts to settle on a definite program to bring the Atlantic ocean closer to the Midwest, will be made here today when delegates from Canada and from 18 states meet for the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence tidewater congress. FORMER BUSINESS MAN NOW BISHOP. John G. Murray to Direct \$3,500,000 Church Turnover and 5,000 Missionaries

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—John Gardner Murray, successful banker and broker, who retired from business at the age of 35 to become a clergyman, has returned to the business field, but as the Right Rev. John Gardner Murray, presiding bishop of the Episcopal church and director of a church business with \$3,500,000 turnover, and an international missionary personnel of 5,000.

CHOSBY BY ELECTION. Bishop Murray is the first presiding bishop to be chosen by election, as well as president of the Episcopal Council of the Episcopal Church. His new title, while ranking him among the most powerful church dignitaries of the world, is much the same as those of the head of any large business concern. His offices are linked with China, Japan, Africa, Alaska, the West Indies, Paris, Brazil, Hawaii and every state in the United States.

ROBERT SCOTT IS LOCATED IN CALIFORNIA

Wanted For Murder For Which Brother Was Doomed

IN PRISON CAMP Russell Scott Saved From Gallows by Last Minute Reprieve

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—An invalid father last summer made frantic appeals by radio, through newspaper and friends for Robert Scott to come home and save his brother, Russell, doomed to die for a murder he said Robert committed. The plea went unheeded, and Russell, once rated as a millionaire in Canada, was snatched from the gallows by a last-minute insanity verdict.

READY FOR PAROLE. A Christmas parole for good conduct, which was to be his when he had a job to go to, has indefinitely been postponed. Chicago prosecutors have arranged to send men to the coast to bring him here.

REFUSES TO TALK. MERCED, Calif., Jan. 4.—Wanted in Chicago in connection with the murder of Joseph Maier, Robert Scott, alias Joseph Redding, was brought down from a convict road camp in the high Sierras last night by two guards.

FOUND IN PRISON CAMP. Hiding under the assumed name of John Redding, he was serving a term in San Quentin prison for robbery of a haberdashery in June, 1924. New he will be brought back here to face trial on a murder indictment, with prosecutors determined to fight for his death.

New Cloth Made of Ostrich Feathers

Canadian Press. LONDON, Jan. 5.—London and Paris shortly will see an entirely new fabric, created by a noted London designer. Its exact composition has been kept a secret, but it is known that ostrich feathers, plucked from the quills and especially treated and woven, are the basis of it. The cloth is lighter than thaladown and softer than the finest crepe de chene, and it displays a different pattern from every angle. Thousands of yards of the material are being made. So striking is the cloth that the manufacturers say they expect it to be all the rage in the west end ball rooms this winter.

Wife's Advanced Views Caused Kemal Pasha To Divorce Her

Railway Board Delays Case From The East

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 5.—The Board of Railway Commissioners this morning postponed the hearing of the complaint of the Boards of Trade of Halifax, Saint John and Sackville, and the Canadian Lumbermen's Association, against the proposal of the Canadian National Railways to eliminate alternative routing via Saint John on west-bound traffic destined to stations on the Canadian Pacific Railway. The complaint will be heard in Montreal at the end of the current week.

Attack On Damascus Stockyards Repulsed

Ex-King Misses Sleeping Rugs More Than Expected Fortune

LONDON, Jan. 5.—Former King Hussein Ben Ali, who recently abdicated when defeated by the forces of Ibn Saoud, Sultan of Nejd and leader of the Wahabi tribesmen, has arrived at Bombay without money, says a dispatch to the Daily Express. He was compelled to borrow from friends to enable him to continue his journey to Bagdad. The correspondent says it is understood that Ali had a large credit in a Bombay bank, but that the bank was closed when he arrived. What worried him most, however, was the disappearance of his three costly silk embroidered sleeping carpets. Therefore he was compelled to sleep under ship's rugs.

MEANWHILE, PRINCESS HELEN MOVES FOR DIVORCE

MOTIVE IN DOUBT

Westminster Gazette Declares Politics, Not Love, Behind Whole Escapade

United Press. MILAN, Jan. 5.—The mystery surrounding the renunciation of Rumanian throne rights by Crown Prince Carol grew deeper today, when Carol's entourage informed the United Press that Carol himself was ignorant of the letter of abdication written to Bucharest and signed allegedly with Carol's name.

FORGERY CHARGED. The United Press informant said the letter of renunciation was written in Rumania while Carol was in Italy. Carol's intimates are insistent that the letter was a forgery to further the political ambitions of Rumanian statesmen.

WIFE SEEKS DIVORCE. Advice from Bucharest are that Princess Helen, wife of Carol, and mother of the four year old boy who will take the father's place in line of succession to the crown of Rumania, has begun the required procedure to divorce Carol.

IS RHODES SCHOLAR. Eugene A. Forsey, Ottawa, Now in N. S., Named For Quebec Province
