**T** HAT justice to the Maritime Province ports demanded the forcing of Canadian trade through our ports in the winter season, was the claim set forward by Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, Rremier of New Brunswick, in setting before the Royal Commission this morning the case for this province. Sir Andrew Duncan, chairman of the Commission, asked how


he would force trade here against the wishes of the shipper, and Mr. Baxter said he would do it by means of an increased freight rate on Canadian goods exported through foreign ports.

That the Valley Railway, designed to connect the National Transcontinental directly with the port of Saint John, and con-structed by the Province of New Brunswick "to overcome a defect in the scheme of a national enterprise," should be absorbed in the Canadian National Railways, was one of the main contentions advanced by Premier Baxter.
