RECENT DEATHS

The death of Robert Power took place yesterday at the residence of his sister, Mrs. John J. Mullin, Waterloo street, at the age of seventy-two. He leaves two sisters, Mrs. J. J. Mullin and Mrs. M. McGuire, both of this city, and one nephew.

Duncan L. Kelly died at the home of T. C. Curran, Queen street, Fredericton, yesterday morning. He leaves seven brothers.

The death of Mrs. William J. Irvin took place Sunday at her home in Millville. She leaves, besides her husband, her parents, Captain and Mrs. Robert W. White, and four small children.

H. Elvin Dalton died at his home, 118 St. James street, on Saturday after a lingering illness. He leaves besides his wife, two daughters, three sons, two sisters and two brothers.

Mrs. John H. Hammond died at her home in Peabody, Mass., on October 3, after a long illness. She leaves her husband, one son, three daughters, three sisters, and two brothers, including William O'Keefe of this city.

The body of Mrs. Elizabeth Foster arrived yesterday at noon on the C. P. R. express, from Oakland, Cal., where she passed away October 5. The body was taken to St. Paul's (Valley) church and the service was conducted by Archdeacon Crowfoot, assisted by Rev. G. A. Kurling, Rev. R. P. McKim and Rev. R. T. McKim. Interment was made in Fernhill. A large number of floral tributes were received.

The death of Benjamin H. Appleby, formerly a conductor on the New York Central lines, took place yesterday morning at the residence of his son, Irving D. Appleby, 11 Whipple street, West 8, John. Mr. Appleby was sixty-five years old and has had an honorable record on the New York Central lines for forty-three years. In 1916 he was stricken with paralysis and was taken to his home in Nauvau, where he recovered to a certain extent, but his death resulted yesterday morning. Besides his wife he leaves three daughters and four sons.

Francis J. Collins, son of the late John and Bridget Collins, of Whitehead, Kings county, died yesterday morning at the age of twenty-seven years. He leaves two brothers and one sister.

Funeral of J. A. Seeds.
A great number of sympathizing friends attended the funeral of James A. Seeds yesterday afternoon from his late residence, 80 Mecklenburg street, to Trinity church, Rev. R. A. Armstrong officiated and James S. Ford presided at the organ. Interment was in Fernhill cemetery. Members of the vestry of the church, of which Mr. Seeds had been warden, walked in a body. Many floral tributes were sent by friends.

Paris, Oct. 14.—The origin of the German story that French airmen flew over the city of Nuremberg and dropped bombs on August 2, 1914, which was made one of the pretexts for declaring war on France, has been brought out at a hearing by a court-martial in an army airplane case. The man who settled the historical point was M. Unne, former administrator of the Salomon Motors Corporation one of the witnesses.

Toward the end of July, 1914, testified M. Unne, the Salomon Company had put a machine in the hands of Aviator Laporte for a flight from Paris to Constantinople. Engine trouble compelled Laporte to land in Bavaria. He informed M. Unne of the mishap and the latter, he said, took a train and went to the place where Laporte had come down. The machine was repaired and the machine was about to start off again when he was prohibited from doing so by the German authorities. On August 1, however, he was released and told he might return to France by way of Nuremberg. Laporte in making his way home, flew over Nuremberg, added M. Unne, and was fired at several times while so doing.
