IN submitting to the members of the Corporation and to the public, this the eighteenth Annual Report of the Halifax School for the Blind, the Board of Managers have great pleasure in stating that the educational work under their management is being carried on in a systematic, intelligent, and satisfactory manner, and that the advancement made from year to year by the School, as evidenced in every department, is the most practical report that can be made as to the affairs of the Institution.

It has been the aim of the Board of Managers so far as the means at its disposal would allow, to approve of and encourage the efforts of the Superintendent to further the educational interests of the blind of the Maritime Provinces, and we have always deemed it false economy to be satisfied with mediocrity in the scope of any of the departments of the School, many years experience having taught us that the education of the blind requires to be of the most thorough character, otherwise the results will be disappointing alike to the public, and to the relatives and friends of those under instruction.
