WILL FINISH THE ROAD SYSTEM

COUNTY COUNCIL DECIDE TO CONTINUE GOOD ROADS UNDER THE 1912 ACT.

After the reading of the minutes of Tuesday's session council Wednesday morning adjourned into committees and the Finance, Printing and Litigation departments were busy all morning. Prospects are that this afternoon the committees will again meet. A great deal of routine work is requiring attention. Coun. Fleet is acting-warden during the absence of Warden Denton and Couns. Lawrence and Hawkins in Toronto.

County Council as a whole does not favor the one-man deputation. Tuesday afternoon it quashed Coun. Oliver's resolution to send Warden Denton alone to interview the Department of Public Works, Toronto, regarding the legal road situation in Oxford by carrying an amendment from Couns. Lawrence and Boles that the Warden and Couns. Hawkins and Lawrence (the mover), compose the party to go on a jaunt.

The feature of the session was the vigorous fight made by Couns. Fleet and Walley, of Ingersoll, for the relief of their town from any responsibility in the building and maintaining of county roads, as it did not participate in the Government grant for Highway Improvements. The trouble began after Couns. Stauffer and Hawkins had introduced the Clerk's by-law designating highways of Oxford to be improved as county roads, and it was being threshed out in committee of the whole.

Coun. Walley objected to his town paying for something which it did not get. "The only way in which that by-law can be made the unanimous voice of this council," he said, "is to eliminate the town of Ingersoll. Then he moved an amendment to the preamble, providing for the desired effect.

Coun. Stauffer, (Blenheim), held the opinion that Ingersoll should add something to the upkeep of the roads as a certain amount of benefit had been derived.

Mr. Walley made a spirited appeal. He admitted that surrounding good rural roads helped businessmen in a degree, but he stood for the artisans who because of their number paid the majority of the taxes, and who were not concerned in any benefit from the roads.

"The Ingersoll artisans Mr. Walley speaks of have been well repaid for the increase in their taxes," said Coun. Hawkins. "By the fact that the farmer has been enabled to bring to their doors cheaper supplies than had they been wallowing in mud to their knees."

"The good roads have not lessened the cost of living," remarked Coun. Fleet. "With all of them, in the past six years the cost of living has advanced 10 or 15 per cent. in the provisions in which the farmer deals."

Coun. Hawkins: "To what extent would the prices have increased were the produce brought in over bad roads. Does Mr. Fleet remember?"

"No."

Coun. Appel, Tavistock, after reviewing road history of the past few years, announced that he was strongly in favor of the by-law. None could consistently be against it, he said, for it was the avenue for even those who were against the present road system, which had to be finished by resolution to continue Good Roads Improvements if the Government repealed by-law 558 under which the work is carried on at present and placed operations under the 1912 Act. It is provided that towns and villages of under 3,000 will be allowed to participate in the system. Coun. Fleet and Walley voted against the resolution.

Should the City of Woodstock pay for the benefit it receives from the good roads of the County? Couns. Stauffer and Hawkins think so. Coun. Hawkins said he hoped for legislation that would provide for this would soon be enacted. In his opinion it would be hard to show that the city, morally, and in every other way, was not entitled to contribute toward the upkeep of County roads.

the good roads system under the 1912 Act. The old by-laws will be repealed and new ones passed. Under the new by-laws all municipalities in the county will participate, except Ingersoll. The local municipality, however, will not be asked to contribute towards the building of roads. Inasmuch as the new by-laws provide that each municipality will get the amount of road asked for and will pay for what they get, the county simply issuing the debentures and collecting from the minor municipalities an amount according to the quantity of road built in each. Unless some arrangement is made with the county, however, it will be necessary for Ingersoll to contribute her share towards the maintenance of the roads until the system is completed and the Government sanctions the return of roads to the care of the townspeople.

The council adjourned in the afternoon, after having given of new road by-law two readings, and will meet again at the call of the Warden when the schedule of roads to be built has been drawn up, and the by-law prepared to raise the money.

Thursday Morning

The report of the special committee—Warden Denton and Couns. Hawkins and Lawrence—which visited Toronto Wednesday to interview the Public Works Department about the best methods to pursue in dealing with the roads of Oxford County, was before the county council Thursday morning, and was adopted without amendment after the members of the committee had been submitted to a cross-fire of questions. The result of the deputation trip was entirely favorable. The department would be pleased to approve of any feasible scheme which the county would prepare, and would consent to the repeal of the present by-law if it were burdensome, and absolute assurance was given that the work would go on. The new by-law designating county roads which has been given its second reading by the council, was submitted and approved, the deputy minister setting forth a few minor changes, and recommending that the by-law indicate the number of miles of road to be built, and the amount of money required to complete the system. The department placed great emphasis on instructions that the sum of money asked for be sufficient. Another particular in which the minister was firm was that no municipality be allowed to drop out of the system.

John Pollard, county road superintendent, explained that road machinery was in need of overhauling and replacing. He suggested the purchase of a new hauling outfit, which would cost \$5,000. Considerable discussion followed this Warden Denton pointing out that in all probability such a heavy outfit would be useless in many portions of the county on account of sand.

A by-law forbidding the erection of fences on public roads was passed. It also put the ban on piling material upon the highways. There was some objection to this measure carried by a vote of 11 to 6.

Upon recommendation of the Finance Committee, grants by by-law were made as follows: North Oxford and South Oxford Women's Institutes, \$25 each; Woodstock Hospital, \$1,000; Ingersoll Hospital, \$1,000; Sick Children's Hospital, Toronto, \$25; Salvation Army, \$50.

FATALITY NEAR NEW LIME KILN

VERNON BAKER OF SOUTH LONDON, ASSISTANT TO C.P.R. SURVEYORS ELECTROCUTED—110,000 VOLTS PASSED THROUGH BODY

 One hundred and ten thousand volts of electricity passing through his body from the Hydro-electric transmission wires, Vernon Baker, a South London young man, probably twenty years of age, was instantly electrocuted in the vicinity of the new lime kiln, east of Centerville, shortly before eleven o'clock this morning.

The victim of the fatality was working with C. P. R. surveyors in the vicinity of the new lime kiln, to which it is the intention to run a spur line of the C. P. R. With him at the time of the accident was a fellow-workman, C. Grigg, of Toronto, but who has been making London his headquarters.

The men, it appears, were anxious to measure the height of the Hydro-electric transmission wires, and Baker it is stated, suggested that they throw their tape line over the wires. Baker made several unsuccessful attempts to throw the tape line over the wires. Greater success attended the attempts by Grigg, and the instant that the tape line settled over the wires, Baker, who was holding the one end of the line, dropped to the ground. His companion shouted to him to drop the line, which he did, but immediately became unconscious.

Two men passing in an automobile stopped, one of them remaining to render first aid, while the other drove into Ingersoll for a Doctor. Heroic efforts were put forth to revive the vital spark but they were unavailing.

Shortly after 12 o'clock the body was brought to McIntyre's undertaking rooms, where it was viewed by Coroner Dr. Coleridge and Chief of Police Fish. After carefully investigating the accident, Coroner Coleridge decided that an inquest was unnecessary.

The First Fatality.

This accident is the first fatality to occur by anyone coming in contact with the high tension wires, since the Hydro-electric system was inaugurated three years ago.

The tape used by the surveyors was of linen reinforced by wire.

ROWELL POLICY WAS APPROVED

BY COMMITTEE ON POLITICAL ACTION AT EXECUTIVE MEETING OF TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE

TORONTO, Feb. 27.—President Joseph Gibson, in his annual address to the members of the Ontario Alliance yesterday, congratulated the delegates on the success of the repeal contests. In three years only one repeal had been scored by their opponents.

It was, Mr. Gibson considered, vital to their cause that the alliance keep out of party politics, and maintained an absolutely non-partisan attitude.

The executive report said: "We regret to have again to report a deficit upon running expenses amounting to \$2,578.29."

During the past year the expansion of local prohibition has been hampered and hindered to a more marked degree than ever before by the three-fifths requirement. The three-fifths has proved itself not only to be a hindrance, but a positive menace to local option. It hinders enforcement and endangers permanence.

After a discussion lasting four hours last night the committee on political action passed a resolution recommending that the convention should place itself on record as expressing its gratification over the fact that Mr. N. W. Rowell, K.C., M.P.P., leader of the Liberal party in the Ontario Legislature, has adopted his policy of "abolition of the bar, the trading system and club licenses."

The vote was unanimously in the affirmative.

Dr. Ferrier Dead.

TORONTO, Feb. 27.—After being in Grace Hospital for several days Dr. D. W. Ferrier, of 35 Leuty avenue, who was injured by being crushed between a westbound King car and a railing around an obstruction on Queen street east, died last night from his injuries.

BRIEFS FROM THE WIRES.

Turkey renewed its offer to cede Adrianople and to conclude peace.

There was desperate fighting in the State of Coahuila, Mexico, yesterday. Brantford citizens urge an increase in the police force in view of recent street disturbances.

The Ontario Land Surveyors' Association concluded their annual convention yesterday and elected J. S. Dobie, Thessalon, president.

The police of Constantinople have discovered a conspiracy against the Government, and have arrested several prominent officers and civilians.

The French Parliament is asked to appropriate immediately \$100,000,000 spread over five years for the renewal and increase of armaments and war materials.

The U. S. House has agreed to the Senate amendments to the bill creating in the Government a new department of labor, to be supervised by a Cabinet official.

Orders for an immediate strike of the members of the Great Lakes Fishermen's Association were sent out from Cleveland last night by President John French of Erie, Pa.

J. G. Sullivan, chief engineer of the western lines of the C.P.R., announced that tenders are being called for a great tunnel 28,000 feet, long to cut through the Rogers Pass hill.

"SYLVIA" IS ILL.

Miss Pankhurst Has Been on Hunger Strike in Prison.

LONDON, Feb. 28.—Mrs. Pankhurst's "hunger strike" will be of even shorter duration than imprisonment. Mrs. Pankhurst has been accustomed to.

The Home Office yesterday overruled the Epsom magistrate, and the suffragette leader was released from Holloway jail on bail last night.

The magistrate had insisted on a pledge that Mrs. Pankhurst would cease campaigning until her trial.

Mrs. Pankhurst, before her release, undertook not to participate personally in the militant suffragette movement pending her trial.

Mrs. Pankhurst will be tried in Old Bailey in April instead of at the Surrey Assizes in June or July, as would have been the case in the ordinary course.

The Suffrage Journal states that Sylvia Pankhurst is seriously ill in Holloway jail as the result of a hunger strike and forcible feeding.

A LENTEN QUEEN.

Pretty Paris Typist Rules For a Day in Gay Metropolis.

PARIS, Feb. 28.—Germaine Bregnat, queen of this year's mid-Lenten carnival, a typewriter in a city office, chosen for the honor by her fellow-working girls owing to her beauty, was received in company with her maids of honor, at the Palace of the Elisee yesterday by Mme. Poincare, wife of President Poincare, who presented her with a diamond bracelet.

Mlle. Bregnat had previously passed in procession through the principal streets, amid the plaudits of thousands of people, who took advantage of the general holiday to engage in lively conflicts lasting until late in the evening.

MISSOURI SCHOOL STAYS AS BEFORE

COUNTY CAN TAKE NO ACTION ON RESOLUTION CREATING THE INSTITUTION—MR. McFARLANE WINS CASE.

Toronto, Feb. 27.—Judge Middleton in single court today gave judgment in favor of John McFarlane, who applies for an injunction to restrain the county from taking any action upon resolution creating the West Missouri Continuation school. W. R. Meredith London, appeared for plaintiff, and G. S. Gibbons for defendant. The judgment reads:

The county having determined to take no action there is nothing now in this action beyond the question of costs. The township had no power to divert the money from the school board or in any way to interfere with its affairs. The school board has the right to receive the money it calls for and to arrange and liquidate its own debts. What the township sought to do when it proposed to pay to the county sufficient to pay the debts of the board, to be proved before the county treasurer, is quite foreign to anything that is authorized by the Municipal Act as ultra vires. The ultra vires action by the municipality and improper payment of municipal can, I think, be restrained by a rate payer in class action.

"Looked at from a broader point of view, the costs of the action really form part of the expense of an unsuccessful attempt by the township to meet free from an obligation imposed by law, and the fairest disposition of costs is to direct payment out of the township funds rather than to impose the burden on the individual.

"For these reasons injunction may be made perpetual and defendant township should be ordered to pay
