A.97	who pleaded your case blamed all your actions on Captain Jessop. Is that not correct? Yes sir.
2.98	And that evidence was given in mitigation of punishment. Isn't that correct? Ies sir.
1.98	
Q.99	So do you not know as a fact that confirmation of your sentence is being held up? Have you been told that?
1.99	
JA:	I don't think this is relevant. Whatever the convening officer decides has nothing to do with this cross-examination of the witness.
Def Offr:	My submission in this connection is this sir, that this witness, together with several other witnesses are not independent witnesses because they know, I submit and they have been told-I submit that the outcome of their - that their sentences are not being confirmed until this trial is completed. Now, if that is a fact sir, I submit that they are not independent witnesses, which the Prosecution will emeavour to argue. If I am in error I will not press it any further.
JA:	The witness has answered your question. He said "No". He has denied it.
Def Offr:	Well then, my questioning was proper?
JAı	Well, it's on the record now. I'll leave it there.
Def Offr:	But you don't wish me to proceed any further?
JA:	Not on that question.
Def Offr:	I am ruled against on that submission?
JA:	Well, what other question do you wish to put?
Def Offr:	I wanted to continue finding out
JA:	I rule the question out of order.
The witness is re-examined by the Prosecutor:	
Q.100	Just one point I wish to re-examine the witness on and that is the question of work tickets. In your employment as fitter with B squadron, during the time you have been with B squadron in 2/7 Recce Regiment, here you had on more than one occasion to have work tickets signed for you in order to carry out your normal duties?
A.100	Yes sir.
Q.101 A.101	Who usually signed those work tickets? Any of the officers that happened to be in the orderly room at the time, sir.
Q.102 A.102	Who would those officers be? Well, it might have been Lieutenant Wagner, Captain Jessop, Lieutenant Coates.
Q.103	Would you say - sorry, I'll re-phrase that question. Have you had a work ticket signed on more than one occasion by Captain Jessop?
A.103	Yes sir.
Q.104 A.104	On many, or few occasions? Many, sir.
