
Final Decision of the Railway Commission in C. P. R. Case,
Ottawa, Sept. 5.—The railway commission yesterday approved the plan and profiles of the G.T.P. railway from Portage La Prairie to the little Saskatchewan River.

The application was vigorously opposed at Aylesworth, K.C., on behalf of the Canadian Pacific, the claim being that the new line paralleled the C.P.R., whereas it was the intent of Parliament that it should go farther to the north, The latter road objected to the invasion of its territory. It also demanded to know the route from Winnipeg to Portage La Prairie.

The G.T.P. counsel relied on the fact that the Minister of Railways and the Government had aiready approved its route and maintained that there was no deviation from what Parliament had intended.

The commission took the view that it had no arbitrary power to prevent the road taking the course proposed, and, according to the reading of the act, there was nothing to prevent the lines going as near together as desired as long as the Government consented.

Dr. Snider Appointed Superintendent For Toronto Insane Asylum.

Toronto, Sept. 5.—Another defeated Conservative candidate at the last Provincial general election has been appointed to an important position in the gift of the Ontario Government. Dr. Daniel Clark, who has been superintendent of the Toronto Insane Asylum on Queen street west since 1875, has retired, and the vacancy has been filled by the appointment of Dr. Fred S. Snider of Waterford to the position.

At the general election in 1802 Dr. Snider headed the poll in North Norfolk, but was unseated on a protest and defeated at the bye-election which sollowed. He was again the Conservative candidate at the general election in ast January, but his Liberal opponent Col. T. R. Atkinson, got a majority of 881.

Alieged That He Has Wife There and Aleë In Detroit.



SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Previnces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Oftawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent receive authority for some one to make entry for him.

The homesteader is required to perperform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence

therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother if the father is deceased) of the homesteador resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
