

THOMAS BRYDON GAINING VOTES

PROGRAMME OF HIS FUTURE MEETINGS

Liberal Candidate is Most Popular Man in Saanich.

Saanich Liberals are enthusiastic in regard to victory on November 25th, and the feeling throughout the district for which Thomas A. Brydon represents the Liberal interest is that the popular candidate should be returned by an overwhelming majority. Reports are being brought in from all parts of the constituency to the effect that there is a Conservative landslide to the Liberal party. The narrow majority of the last election was long ago wiped out, and daily the Liberal candidate is getting more supporters who promise him their votes at the polling booths.

His meetings have been largely attended by electors, and his cause is gathering strength every day. The candidate is extremely popular throughout the Saanich district, where his interests lie, and he is looked on as a man of the farming element who best knows the needs of the growing district and is best fitted to represent it in parliament.

Mr. Brydon will have half a dozen public meetings before the day of election, and will address all the electors again. He will commence the coming week with an address at Gordon Head on Tuesday night, and will wind the campaign up with a gathering at Royal Oak on the night before election day. SHOT DOWN IN STREET.

Man Murdered by Three Thugs at Los Angeles.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 13.—The police to-day are combing the city in an effort to run to earth the three thugs who shortly after midnight shot P. A. Wilder, a coachman, in West Twenty-third street, the most fashionable residential section of the city.

Ten minutes before the murder of Wilder the footpads fired four shots at W. B. Elms, department manager of the Broadway department store, who was hurrying toward his home with a large sum of money in his pockets. They refused his commands to halt and made his escape amid a fusillade of bullets from their revolvers.

Wilder's pockets were rifled and two bullet holes in his head showed that his death probably was instantaneous.

DIES SUDDENLY.

Portland, Ore., Nov. 13.—Edmund B. Conant, for many years passenger conductor on the Union Pacific line out of Portland, died at his home here to-day of heart failure. He was 68 years old.

FIXED LOCATION OF STREET LIGHTS

Electric Light Committee Grapples With a Knotty Problem.

At a meeting of the electric light committee of the City Council held Friday consideration was given to the question as to the location of the city new electric lights which have just been received to augment the service in the residential section. The members of the committee found the task a very difficult one, as there were a large number of applications in excess of the number of lamps. The locations so far decided on are:

Lewis street, corner of Montreal and Simcoe streets, Dallas road and Bushby street, First street and Fernwood road, Grant street between Cook and Chamber street, Rudin road and Fernwood road, Pandora avenue at intersection of Milne and Pembroke streets, Cook street and Johnson street, Quadra street and Caledonia avenue, Quadra street and Queen's street, Manchester road and Burnside road, Cecilia street and Manchester road, Saanich road, two lights between the present lights, McPherson avenue in excess of the number of lamps, Richardson street and Truich street, Richardson street east of Moss street.

ELECTRIC ENGINES ON GREAT NORTHERN

Coal Burning Locomotives to Be Taken Off Cascade Division.

Everett, Wash., Nov. 13.—The use of motors in the Great Northern Cascade tunnel has proved so successful from the viewpoints of speed, cleanliness and safety that the company has plans to now under way, by which the whole of the Cascade division, from Wenatchee to Everett, will be equipped with the electric engines, meaning the complete elimination of the coal burning locomotives. To harness the power necessary to drive the motors of the division will, it is stated, require an expenditure of \$2,000,000. This expenditure will create the harnessing of 80,000 horse power in addition to the 12,000 already in use at Leavenworth. To take care of additional needs 4,000 additional horse power will be added in the immediate future. The falls at Lake Chelan is where the railroad expects to obtain its gigantic power.

Although no official announcement has been made to this effect, it is generally believed that the steps for improvement being taken by the Great Northern are but the first guns in a final fight against the Milwaukee interests now striving for admission to the territory about the Everett-Milwaukee line. It is known to be aggressively upon the move for a footing in the city.

MAY ERECT NEW PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS

Ministers of Manitoba Are Now Considering the Matter.

Winnipeg, Nov. 13.—It was learned yesterday on the best of authority that the ministers of the local government are seriously considering the question of erecting new parliament buildings.

It is understood that no definite offer has been decided upon but that they are in favor of the site where the present edifice stands.

It could not be learned definitely but it is believed that the construction of a new building will be started next year. The ministers, with one accord, state that the present structure has outgrown its usefulness, and that it is totally inadequate for administering the affairs of the province.

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JOHN OLIVER OFFERS SOLUTION

LIBERAL LEADER TAKES UP INDIAN RESERVE

R. L. Drury Announces Proposition at Friday Evening's Rally in Victoria West.

If the citizens of Victoria only do their duty on the 25th the Songhees Indian reserve question will become a thing of the past in a very short time, for the leader of the opposition, John Oliver, has taken the matter up in a business-like way, and all that is needed is the support of the electors to have the scheme put into effect. The announcement was made at the Liberal meeting at Victoria West on Friday when R. L. Drury stated that he had been empowered by John Oliver to outline his plan.

Briefly stated, Mr. Oliver's proposal is that in view of the complex nature of the question involving interests represented by no less than four parties, namely, the Indians, the Dominion government, the provincial government and the city of Victoria, that the provincial government should advance the money necessary to buy out the Indians and acquire an absolute title to the lands. In this way a simplified transaction could be presented to the Indians and they would then know exactly what was coming to them. Every time an effort has been made to induce the Indians to vacate the reserve and sign away their rights to the land the Indians wanted to know what the sum total was that would be coming to them, but no such answer could be given to the Indians because it could not be stated what the reserve could be sold for, and moreover the reversionary rights of the province and the claims of the city of Victoria had to be dealt with.

But under Mr. Oliver's proposal the Indians will be approached with an offer to sell the land for a certain sum of money, and the full market value for the land, the province thus acquiring the absolute title. The city then would receive a complete deed of that portion of the reserve intended to be conveyed to them under order in council.

The meeting last night at Temple's hall, Victoria West, was presided over by James Tagg, and was in every respect a most gratifying one for the Liberal candidates. The chairman's remarks were very brief.
