He says that it is generally believed that the railway will reach the Pacific Coast north of the Skeena. But the point on which there is considerable discussion is whether Tuck's Inlet or some of the many splendid harbors farther up the coast will be selected as the western terminus of the railway. The former, however, seems to be the spot favored

by most of those who deem themselves "good guessers."
When the Grand Trunk Pacific officials made a trip up the coast they inspected Tuck's Inlet very closely.
