DEATH OF CAPT. PIDGEON. Descendant of the Loyalists and Well Known Citizen.

Descendant of the Loyalists and a Well Known Citizen.

Captain David M. Pidgeon, of the West Side, passed away this morning between twelve and one o'clock at his home, 35 Middle street, after dait a long illness. The deceased was captain of the ferry boat for a number of years, but for the last eight or ten years has been retired from active life. Captain Pidgeon leaves four children. C. B. Pidgeon, formerly of Indiantown and now of Sydney; Miss Bessie Pidgeon, a home, Mrs. Simpson, of Waterloo street, and Mrs. Minnie Currie, who is stenographer with J. D. Seely. His son will be home tomorrow. Captain Pidgeon had reached the age of 38 years, today being his birthday. He was twice married, surviving his second wife, who died three or four years ago. He was well known and greatly respected, and will be greatly missed in the vicinity.

Capt. Pidgeon was a son of Henry Pidgeon, one of the Loyalists who came here with his family in 1786. Henry Pidgeon's father brought a shipload of people here from Long Island, N. Y., but the vessel was wrecked at Black Point, and with two exceptions all on board were lost. The survivors were Henry Pidgeon, aged 8, and another young boy. Henry was apprenticed to a carpenter in St. John, and afterwards received a grant of land at the foot of Prince William street, where the three lights now stand. He traded this for enough leather to make a pair of boots, and snortly afterwards moved to Kars, Kings Co., where he settled down to farming. His son, Capt. Jacob Pidgeon, was the youngest of a family of twelve. Jacob was married twice, his first wife being Miss Sussn Davis of Springfield, and the second Miss Mary J. Lane of Carleton.

Capt. Pidgeon remained at the homestead for many years, and it is said that he was the first man to bring a raft through the falls. For eleven years he was captain of the ferry boat, and for three years ran the Millidgeville ferry, He has been well known in marrine circles for a long time and was a memper of the board of shery commissioners.
