"I've done with politics. I know when I have had enough, I'm looking after business now," he told The Herald.

"But why?—he has the Western American States." "True; but the largest carriers in the world are Mr. Hill's leviathans—the Dakota and Minneapolis, which are engaged in the trade with the Far East. He wants to divert as much of Canada's produce from Vancouver and Prince Rupert as he can. I don't think we should help him to do that. "The way to make Canada great is to preserve Canada's products for Canada's ports."
