The weekly tennis tea of the St. John Tennis Club, postponed on Wednesday, will take place this afternoon. A special meeting of the club will be held at the grounds at half-past five for the election of members.

Mr. Bedford of Moncton was in the city yesterday, searching for his son, about 18 years of age, who disappeared from his home on Monday. Mr. Bedford thinks perhaps the boy went off with another young fellow to the United States.

No. 2 chemical was called out to Victoria street last evening to extinguish a bonfire lighted by a number of boys. The fire first beyond the boys' control and some of the neighbors, becoming anxious, sent in a still alarm. No damage was done.

The directors of the Horticultural Society held a special meeting yesterday morning and considered the recent poisoning case in Lily Lake. It was decided that hereafter the lake fishing will be carefully protected and steps taken to punish all offenders.

Rev. D. Lang, who arrived home yesterday from Montreal, where he was attending the general assembly of the Presbyterian church, said he was most representative ever held in Canada. The points that excited the greatest interest were the questions of church union, the heresy charges against Prof. Gordon and the home and foreign mission development.

On Tuesday next the local Council of Women will meet for the purpose of electing delegates to attend the 12th annual convention of the Council of Women to be held in Vancouver on July 15th. Five delegates are to be chosen and Mrs. D. McLellan will be an ex-officio delegate on account of her position as president of the local council.

The relatives of Arthur Cassidy, this city, who left for the west in March, have received no word from him since the 16th of April, when he was at Calgary. Friends in British Columbia have been notified of his continued absence and if word does not soon arrive, J. Wesley Cassidy, the young man's father, will go in search of his son. He fears the young man may have met with foul play, as he had considerable money with him.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Health held yesterday afternoon the greater part of the time was taken up with the consideration of accounts from the Isolation Hospital. The report of the board physician regarding the smallpox situation at St. Martin's was reviewed. The houses are now being disinfected, and the work will be completed by the first of next week. The two patients at the Isolation Hospital are progressing favorably.

A telegram received by Wm. F. Lewis of Wm. Lewis and Son, last evening, stated that H. Edgar Davidson, his brother-in-law, and a former St. John boy, was very ill in St. Joseph's Hospital, at Port Arthur, Ont., where he has been located for the past two or three years. As a result of a severe attack of pneumonia, he underwent surgical treatment, which has left him very weak. While hopes are held out for his recovery his condition is very serious. His many friends here will learn of his illness with great regret.

MAN'S BODY FOUND IN OROMOCTO RIVER

The body of an unknown man was found in the East Inlet of the South Branch Lake, Oromocto, on Tuesday, by Capt. Kuppey. The man's identity has not yet been learned. He was apparently a lumberman, and a number of letters addressed to men in Quinn's camp were in his possession. They were dated October 23 and 24. The body is now anchored in the lake pending an inquest. Mr. Mooney, the postmaster at Lepreau, said he sometimes gave letters to men going into the camps, but did not remember having given any letters to anyone answering the description of the man whose body was found.

J. H. Driscoll of this city said last evening that Mr. Quinn was out on the drive and would be in Lepreau on Saturday. When the men returned from the woods at Christmas they did not report anyone missing, nor did Mr. Quinn complain of any missing letters. It is quite possible, however, that he was unaware that the letters found on the man had ever been sent. As soon as arrangements can be made to be held, it is probable that some information may be elicited that will lead to the man's identification.

CARPENTERS' UNION ELECTED OFFICERS

The local Carpenters' Union, No. 912, held their annual meeting last evening. Officers for the ensuing year were elected and after the officials had been chosen, the meeting was transformed into a smoker, and the members of the union passed a most enjoyable evening.

QUEBEC VILLAGE WAS BADLY SCORCHED

ST. AGATHE DES MONTS, June 12—A disastrous fire broke out in the centre of this village this afternoon shortly before three o'clock which completely destroyed ten stores and residences and caused probably \$20,000 damage. There was a good breeze blowing from the lake when the fire was discovered and it spread very rapidly despite the efforts of the firemen. Indeed, for a time it was thought the whole village was doomed. Assistance was secured from St. Jerome and the fire extinguished.

DEATHS

INFANT OF MR. AND MRS. JAMES MCGRAW.
Mr. and Mrs. James McGraw arrived here yesterday accompanying the remains of their baby boy who died in Alton, Florida, on Saturday. Interment will take place here. Mrs. McGraw is a daughter of P. Toie of Lancaster Heights.

MRS. TAYLOR.
The death took place at the Home for Incurables on Tuesday evening of Mrs. Taylor, widow of Dr. Taylor of Hampton. Mrs. Taylor had been in poor health for some time, but only entered the Home about a week ago. She was a daughter of the late Dr. S. Z. Esch, and was twice married. Her first husband was George, City of Hampton, formerly a member of the legislature, and at the time of his death judge of probate for Kings county. Dr. Taylor, her second husband, was also a former member of the legislature, and at the time of his death held the position of registrar of deeds for Kings county. Mrs. A. Peters, wife of the deputy commissioner of agriculture, is an adopted daughter.

ELIZA JANE HOPE.
Miss Eliza Jane Hope, another patient at the Home, died yesterday morning. She also was but recently admitted, and death resulted from consumption. Miss Hope was about fifty years of age, and belonged to Lepreau, where she has a sister living, and a brother in Eastport.

MRS. ROBERT FINLEY.
The death occurred yesterday morning at Ketepee, of Mrs. Robert Finley, an aged and respected resident of that place. Mrs. Finley was 71 years of age and is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Brittain of Ketepee.

EMERY WARD.
The death of Emery L. Ward took place yesterday. The deceased was the son of Mrs. John Longley and the late David Ward and was only sixteen years of age. He is survived by his mother and one brother, David. The burial will take place Saturday morning at Highfield, Kings Co., and the funeral service will be held at 8 p. m. Thursday at the late residence of the deceased, 45 Brunel street.

FRANK CARNEY.
HOPWELL HILL, via Albert, N. B., June 12—Frank Carney, an old and highly esteemed citizen, whose illness has been noted, died at his home here at 10 a. m. today, his death causing universal regret throughout the community, where he had resided for upwards of thirty years. The deceased was taken ill two weeks ago, and although he improved for a time, a series of relapses brought about a condition from which it was impossible to rally. Paralysis eventually developed, from which death ensued. Mr. Carney, who was about 75 years of age, came to this province from Prince Edward Island when quite a small child. He spent his early life in Harvey, Albert Co., and came to this village about 25 years ago, residing here continuously since. His father was Frank Carney, his mother being formerly Miss Charlotte McGinnis of Glasgow, Scotland. The deceased was a man of the strictest uprightness and integrity, and from his boyhood made his way in life unaided, enjoying the respect of all with whom he came in contact. His whole life was characterized by industry and sobriety, and the competence he well earned was a just reward of a well regulated life. From his youth the deceased was a total abstainer and for many years had been a member of the Baptist Church. In politics he was a strong Conservative. The deceased is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Charlotte McCreedy of St. John, but no children. He also leaves one sister, Mrs. J. E. Parshley, of Portland, Me., who was here at the time of his death, and two half-sisters, Mrs. Gittus of Philadelphia, and Mrs. Hall of California, and a half-brother, the Rev. James Carney of Indiana.
