# CHURCHILL-HOZIER WEDDING.

Member of the Asquith Cabinet Will Marry on September 15th.

**LONDON, Sept. 3.**—The marriage which has been arranged between Winston Churchill and Miss Clementine Hozier will take place, probably in St. Margaret's Church, Westminster, on September 15. It is now known that the engagement was made several weeks ago, but the couple by mutual agreement decided not to announce it until just one month previous to the wedding. A long friendship has existed between the Churchill and Hozier families, and the engaged couple have known each other for several years. Miss Hozier was presented at court four years ago. Her mother, Lady Blanche Hozier, is a daughter of the seventh Earl of Arlre. By a curious coincidence the career of Lady Blanche's late husband was similar to that of her prospective son-in-law. Sir Henry Hozier was in the Third Dragoon Guards, and he served with the Royal Artillery in China, and took part as a newspaper correspondent in the war between Austria and Denmark and the war between Prussia and Austria in 1866. Mr. Churchill, who is president of the Board of Trade in the present Cabinet, is the fourth member of the Asquith Government to be married while in office. Other ministerial weddings have been: Lord Lorneburn, the Lord Chancellor, and Miss Violet Hicks Beach, St. Stephen's Chapel, last December. Reginald McKenna, first lord of the admiralty, and Miss Pamela Evelyn, at St. Margaret's, Westminster, on June 3. C. F. G. Masterman, parliamentary secretary of the Local Government Office, and Miss Lucy Lottelson, at Westminster Abbey, on June 2.

## MUTINY QUELLED WITH BLOODSHED

**SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Sept. 3.**—News of a mutiny and a tragedy which broke out on the ship *Albatross*, during a stormy voyage, in which the vessel was dismantled, was brought here today from Tahiti. The *Albatross* was bound from Newcastle, Australia, to Valparaiso with a cargo of coal. On August 12, when the ship was about sixty miles from Tahiti, a storm sprang up, tearing the masts and rigging and the decks with debris. Subsequently, while Captain McLean was making every effort to bring the ship safely to port, the sailors became mutinous and in the trouble that followed, a sailor named William, who was picked up by a French power boat and taken to Papeete, where she will be repaid.

## FRENCH PRETENDER ON THE PACIFIC COAST

**SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 4.**—Accompanied by a party of friends, including Mr. H. Debernis and Countess De Brionde, Duke Ferdinand de Montpensier, son of Louis Philippe d'Orleans, chairman of the Franco-Pacific Mail liner Mongolia yesterday, and is registered at the Hotel de la Paix. The Duke is expected to stay in San Francisco several days, and will visit various parts of the United States and Canada, sailing for Europe in October. He said that he expected to return to this country next year. The Duke is 22 years old. He is a cousin of the King of Spain and related to the King of Portugal. Germany declines to recognize the theory of the French foreign office, that France and Spain, being the monarchs of the powers in Morocco, have the right to initiate suggestions and are not proposed to allow Mulai Hafid to be compelled to take over large and indefinite French pecuniary claims, the effect of which at outset of his reign would be to reduce him to the position of a French vassal.

## PARIS, Sept. 4.

French official circles deeply resent the communication from Berlin, but the real purpose of France in delaying the recognition of Mulai Hafid is to permit the republic to make advance private arrangements for the protection of special French interests. The Associated Press was today authorized to publish the following: You can categorically deny any such intimations. We are conducting no private negotiations. What we are doing is in the general interest of the powers. After Mulai Hafid is recognized we are confident that we will be able to take care of ourselves. The German attempt to make it appear that France some time ago sent a consular official, Dr. Vassel, to Fez also is officially repudiated. It is explained that the man France sent was a native of Algeria, whose mission was simply to act as custodian of the valuable French archives there. He was in no sense a consul. With reference to the German suggestion that France is trying to secure from Mulai Hafid advance endorsement of the loans made by French interests to Abd El Aziz, it is explained that the French creditors of Abd El Aziz hold his jewels as security and that the other loans were made by Moroccan state banks in which Germany, like the other powers, has a representative. France is still awaiting Spain's final approval of the terms of the joint note before communicating it to the powers.

**MOBILE, Sept. 4.**—William Sossomano, a 17 year old white boy, was killed last night by Henry Leech, aged 18, in a mimic duel. # SCOTT ACT CASES AT FREDERICTON

M. V. Padlock Exonerates Shench Beer Hotel Keeper Guilty of Third Offence.

**FREDERICTON, N. B., Sept. 4.**—The local government held a short session this morning and transacted routine business. At the police court Mr. M. V. Padlock, of St. John, gave evidence in the Scott Act case against Lindsay, charged with selling Shench beer contrary to the Licensing Temperance Act, the claim being that the beer contained alcohol more than is allowed. Mr. Padlock's evidence was to the effect that the beer was permissible, the percentage of alcohol not being sufficient. The magistrate delivered judgment in the case of the third offence of a local hotel proprietor finding the charge proven. On request of counsel the matter was stood over until next week.

## WON'T LET GERMANY GET THE LEAD IN MOROCCO

**BERLIN, Sept. 4.**—The French policy in Morocco has been interpreted in this city as designed principally to dislodge Germany out of any direct influence in Moroccan affairs with the ultimate purpose, supported by Great Britain, of acquiring that paramount position which was the object of France previous to the Algeiras conference. French aims are regarded as being precisely what they were before Germany brought about this conference and with the present determination of Germany. This also may be described as exactly what was held to previous to the Algeiras conference, namely, the independence of Morocco politically and commercially, with no superior position for France or any other power.

## DEATH ROLL

**SYDNEY, N. S., Sept. 4.**—The sudden death of E. B. Randall occurred last evening at his home on Douglas Place, about 8.15. The late Mr. Randall had been in his usual health all day and had returned home about five o'clock, and it was in his garden that he took suddenly ill and expired. The deceased was 72 years old, and is survived by three daughters, Miss Minnie, Mrs. F. G. Morris, of this city, and Mrs. Hurley, of Londonbury, N. S., and one son, Dr. Randall, of Truro. The remains will be forwarded to Bayfield, N. S., today for burial.

## KILLING A KING.

In all monarchies the killing of the king or emperor, the Law Journal of London points out, "is perhaps the gravest form of high treason." The Journal adds: "In one country, Italy, sentence of death cannot be imposed, and in Portugal we believe that capital punishment is not used, if not abolished. Under the law of treason of the United Kingdom, which has been applied to most of the king's dominions abroad, with or without statutory modifications, the killing of the king is a capital offence by the statute of treasons. It is there described as compassing or imagining the death of our lord the king. By later legislation of 1800 the elaborate provisions special to trials for treason do not apply to assassinations of the sovereign or a direct attempt on his life, and such offenses are tried in the same manner as wilful murder. The result is that in substance, though not in form, the killing of the sovereign is triable and punishable in the same manner as the wilful murder of a subject, but the crown may direct the execution to be by decapitation, instead of hanging."

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## TARS ARE TIRED OF FORMAL FESTIVITIES

**Big Carnival at Melbourne Ended With Dinner Arranged for 27,000 Which Few Attend.**

**MELBOURNE, Sept. 4.**—Today completed a week's carnival, in which the entire population of Melbourne and ten of thousands of those living outside the city, participated. The universal verdict is that the crowds and traffic on the railways and tramways far exceeded the record made at the time of the visit of the Prince of Wales in 1901. Nelson's Bay has been the scene of continuous activity, the steamers conveying thousands of sightseers to the various points of interest and to the battlefields that are lying at anchor there. A large number of members of parliament and government officials, accompanied by many ladies visited the Connecticut today and were given a warm welcome aboard the flagship. Many of the officers of the fleet were taken in automobiles this morning to Black Spur Mountains where the most picturesque scenery in the vicinity of Melbourne is to be found. That the officers and men of the fleet prefer to enjoy themselves with their saw-made friends, free from official restrictions was strongly exemplified last evening, when very few of the Americans were present at the dinner which the Federal government had arranged for 27,000 in the exhibition building. Premier Deakin said that he thought the men had become tired of formal ceremonies.
