

B., Aug. 3, — Re-duction in stumpare ratés for the logging season 1931-32 effective on August 1st, 1931, is announced in the official order issued today by Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, Minister of Lands and Mines. The Government in tak-ing this action is following the cour-se adouted last year in order to sti-mulate activity in the lumbering in-dustry in New Brunswick. The reduction is to be put into effect provided that assurance is received from the Federal Govern-ment of satisfactory assistance is thereby occasioned to the Provin-cial Treasury.
