The driver of the truck, Arthur E. Porter, of Houlton, received minor injuries. He is held by the county attorney for further questioning.

OPEN SEASON FOR PARTRIDGE SHOOTING IN NEW BRUNSWICK FROM OCTOBER 1st TO 15th

Grand Manan, Campobello and Deer Island Excepted in Order — New Regulation Respecting Possession of Partridge After Close of Open Season.

Fredericton, N. B., August 4th. — New Brunswick will have an open season for partridge shooting from October 1st to October 15th this year in order to this effect having been issued by Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, Minister of Lands and Mines. This short open season has not however been authorized for the islands of Grand Manan and Campobello and Deer Island in 1931 while there is a further regulation in the official order-in-council which prohibits the retention of partridge for ten days after the close of the open season.

It is further stipulated that the onus of proof that partridge, possessed under this regulation, were lawfully killed shall be on the person having such birds in possession. The following is the official order-in-council under which the open season has been declared. "That by Section 13 of Chapter 98 of R. S. 1927, 'The Game Act', it is provided that the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council may by Order-in-Council passed at any time previous to the first of August in any year declare an open season for partridge. The Act further states 'That no person shall take more than six (6) partridge in any one day or more than twenty (20) partridge during such open season.'

"The Honourable the Minister of Lands and Mines now recommends that there be authorized a short open season for partridge, except on Islands of Grand Manan, Campobello and Deer Island, to extend from October first to October fifteenth inclusive, subject to the bag limit established by law of not more than six (6) in one day and no more than twenty (20) during the open season and subject to compliance with the following conditions and regulations:—

"Non-residents desiring to hunt partridge, unless they are the holders of Moose or Deer licenses, must take out the Non-resident 'Game Bird' license at \$25.00. Residents who are not holders of Moose or Deer licenses who desire to hunt partridge or other 'Game Birds' license for \$1.00. 'Game Bird' license gives the right to take partridge, geese, ducks, brant, woodcock and other Game Birds during the open season provided for each 'Game Bird'. Licenses will not be issued to persons under sixteen (16) years of age. Holders of 'Game Bird' licenses must report the number of each kind of Game Birds killed by them to the Chief Game Warden immediately after the close of the open season.

"Notwithstanding anything contained in the Game Act or regulations thereunder, partridge killed during the open season for the killing of partridge in any year may, to the extent of not more than twelve partridge, be retained by the person killing same for ten days after the close of such open season. The onus of proof that partridge possessed under this regulation were lawfully killed shall be on the person having such birds in possession. 'Any person violating any of the provisions of this regulation will be liable to a penalty of not less than \$10.00 and not more than \$25.00 for each offence and in default of payment thereof to imprisonment for not more than twenty (20) days.'

STUMPAGE RATES ARE REDUCED

Provincial Government takes Similar Action to that of Last Year in Reducing Stumpage Rates in Lumber Industry of Province — Official Order Announced Today.

Fredericton, N. B., Aug. 3. — Reduction in stumpage rates for the logging season 1931-32 effective on August 1st, 1931, is announced in the official order issued today by Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, Minister of Lands and Mines. The Government in taking this action is following the course adopted last year in order to stimulate activity in the lumbering industry in New Brunswick.

The reduction is to be put into effect provided that assurance is received from the Federal Government satisfactory assistance in bearing the loss of revenue which is thereby occasioned to the Provincial Treasury. Last year the Government was able to apply the deficit incurred by the reduction to a portion of unemployment relief money secured from the Federal authorities. That portion was 15 per cent of whatever loss resulted to the Provincial Government's revenue as a result of the lower rates of stumpage being collected under this new order.

The stumpage rate is reduced by one-third, and it is felt that such action will result in a greater activity on the part of the lumber operators of the Province during the logging season of 1931-32. This move on the part of the Government is part of a vigorous campaign to increase employment in the Province during the coming season. A summary of the order is given herewith, indicating the reduction which has been made under the order-in-council officially announced today:

"For Spruce, Fir, Pine, Hemlock and Cedar saw logs per M. superficial feet to be \$2.00. "For Spruce and Fir Logs, when used for pulpwood per M. superficial feet to be \$2.70. "For all other classes of lumber stumpage to be one-third less than the rates in effect in 1929-30. The reduced rates of stumpage shall not apply to licensees who have charge of timber from the date of this order-in-council. It limits a rate of stumpage more than double such reduced rates."

ROADS NOW PERFECT SAYS HOTELMAN

Fredericton, N. B., July 31, 1931. — "Everyone who registers at our hotel tells us that the roads are in perfect condition, especially on Route No. 2," says Robert Spiro, proprietor of the Grand Central Hotel, Edmundston, in a letter addressed to D. Leo DeLanoy, Director, New Brunswick Government Bureau of Information and Tourist Travel. "Further along in his letter Mr. Spiro says that 'the only trouble here is the dust problem' but that he is confident that the highway engineering experiments now being conducted by the Department of Public Works will prove effective in overcoming this menace. 'Our big trade this year is from Ontario,' the letter reads.



RECIPIES: CAMP CORN DOGGERS: Put one quart cornmeal into a bowl. Make a hollow in center of meal and into this put one table-spoon salt. Pour over this equal part Borden's St. Charles Milk and water heated to scalding point, stirring all the time until a dough is formed which can be molded with hands. Cool slightly, form into cakes and cook slowly on a wellgreased griddle. (The quantity of diluted milk depends on the kind of cornmeal used.)
