

DELEGATION TO FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

Fredericton, April 22.—A large delegation from Stanley waited upon the Provincial Government this evening and asked that the Government grant the usual subsidy for the extension of the York & Carleton Railway through its present terminus at Ryan's Brook, about five miles above Stanley to connect with the Grand Trunk Railway at Nappadogan Lake, the divisional point.

Dr. Moore, the chief owner and manager of the road, was present with the delegation which included prominent residents of the parish of Stanley including Douglas, Arthur Pringle and about fifteen others.

Fredericton, N. B., April 22.—The Corporations Committee this morning further considered the Tobique Pulp & Paper Co. bill and unanimously agreed to stand it over for one year. The bill to incorporate the St. John Valley Ry. Co. was taken up and explained by J. J. F. Winslow, solicitor for the company. The estimated cost of the road was quite fully discussed, it being stated that it was intended to construct a first class road. The route of the railway was discussed at length. Premier Hazen stated that it must be insisted that the road follow the St. John River as closely as possible below Woodstock. Unless this was insisted upon, it might be that after the Oroonoto was reached the route would be across country to Westfield, and thus leave out the section of country now in possession of the C. P. R.
