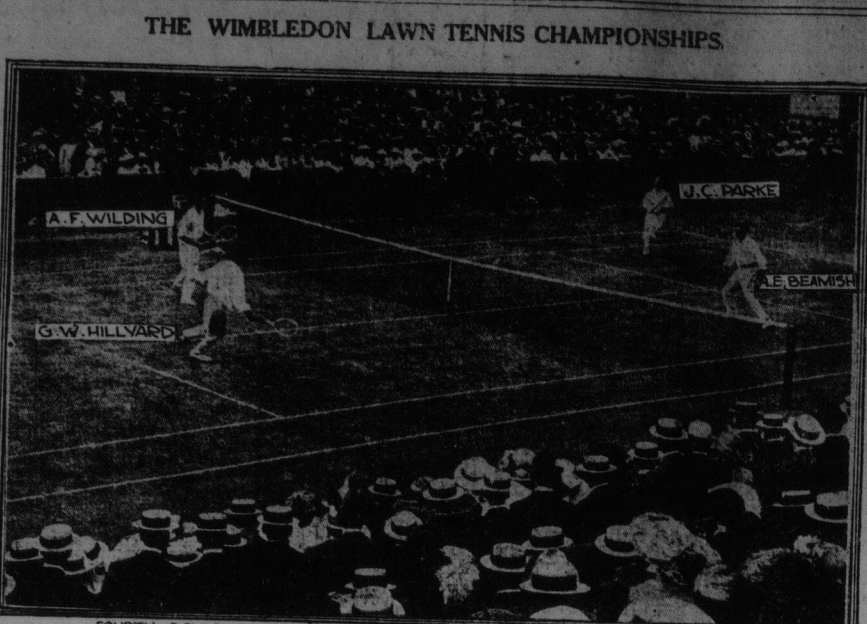
FAIRVILLE, 15; MARTELOS, 2.

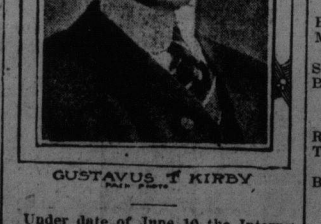
