SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

The sole object of a family, or male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency in the District. Entry by proxy may be made by a duly authorized agent, but not by Sub-Agency, on certain conditions.

Duties of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within limits of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$20.00 per acre.

Pre-emption months residence in each of three years after earning homesteaded land. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homesteaded patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$30.00 per acre. A live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
