AUSTRIAN WARSHIPS SHELL ITALIAN RY. DN

Rome, July 27, via Paris—Certain light Austrian cruisers and four Austrian torpedo boat destroyers at flawn today bombarded several points on the railway which runs along the shore of the Adriatic between Senigallia, sixteen miles west northwest of Ancona and Pesaro. At the same time several shells were thrown into the villages of Fano and Senigallia. At the same hour hydro-aeroplanes fropped bombs on Ancona. Neither bombardment killed or wounded any one, and the damage inflicted was slight.
