From drug store he ricochets to doctor, blaming the weather, the money market, the trusts or Teddy for what is really due to little Mary. Your middle-aged man is at his worst when on his travels—this only exercise a sad procession to and from the dining car."

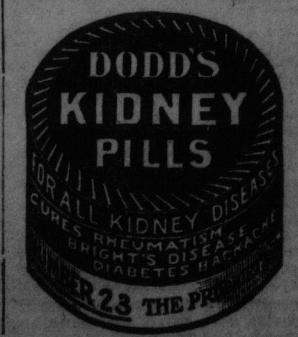
Another William is of the same opinion. Mr. W. A. Cooper, who claims that among other things he provides three million meals a year to travellers on the Canadian Pacific Railway. Mr. Cooper is not a philosopher, but a practical man, and in his own way set out to investigate and solve this problem. He wrote to, or consulted personally, the leading stomach specialists in Europe, the United States and Canada. What he wanted was the happy travellers on his dining cars, who would really enjoy the three million meals on which his chefs spent so much trouble. Was the man of forty hopeless?

The specialists pocketed their fees and gave Mr. Cooper not quite three million, but still a great many opinions to digest. The Wiesbaden man said this, the Paris man said that, the London man said something else, the New York man had another cure, while the Battle Creek man was in a class by himself. Yet when their opinions came to be analysed they all had one common point of view, namely, that the foods consumed in any meal must be properly blended. Everyone who has survived the ordeal knows that it is a mistake to wash down oysters with brandy. Quite a number feel unhappy after a mixture of lemonade and ice cream. Table beer may be good in itself, but not followed by a cup of cocoa. In a word, the foods must blend if the meal is to serve its purpose, and more particularly so in the case of train travellers who have little opportunity for exercise.

With the aid, therefore, of expert food chemists and professors, Mr. Cooper has prepared arrangements of courses which can be recommended by the faculty as perfect blending of food and liquids. These will be printed as suggested menus on the regular cards and placed as suggestions for breakfast, lunch and supper at the disposal of the travellers on the Canadian Pacific this summer. In some ways the railway may lose revenue, for the blended meals do not encourage the rich and sometimes costly entremets which gourmets ask for, but the average man will be contented, and will be left in a better mood to enjoy the beautiful scenery through which the railway passes. In that way he will be a booster for Canada, and, what is better still, will be a more frequent patron of the dining car than of the hospital for dyspeptics.

## PRESENTATION TO SOLDIERS AT ST. STEPHEN

Men of 55th made recipients of gifts prior to departure for Sussex.

St. Stephen, May 10.—The Company of the 55th Battalion that has been in training here and has been selected for early service overseas, entrained this morning for Sussex where it will be in camp for a time with the other men, mostly from the mounted rifles, that will make up the complete company. Yesterday the men attended service in the Congregational and Catholic churches at Milltown, headed by Short's Military Band that was specially organized for service with the soldiers while here.

Over eighty soldiers were in line and with the band also in uniform made a splendid appearance. In the absence of Capt. H. J. Smith, who had gone to Sussex, the command fell upon Lieut. A. Watson Gregory, who accompanies them to England. On their return to barracks, they were waited on by a delegation of ladies from the Women's Canadian Club and presented with 'bundles' containing pipes, tobacco, gum, etc., each man receiving a bundle. The presentation was made by Mrs. George J. Clarke in brief but very fitting words. Before leaving the barracks this morning each man was presented with a box of cigars from Hon. Geo. J. Clarke, and the other local members with filled lunch boxes from the ladies churches, and several cases of soft beer were furnished by the C. M. B. A. With Short's Military Band and the Milltown Band at their head, and preceded by autos carrying the Premier, the Mayors of St. Stephen and Milltown and the St. Stephen town council the soldiers marched through a few streets and proceeded to the station where they were briefly addressed by Premier Clarke, and were given a rousing send-off, fully four thousand people being present and all deeply interested.

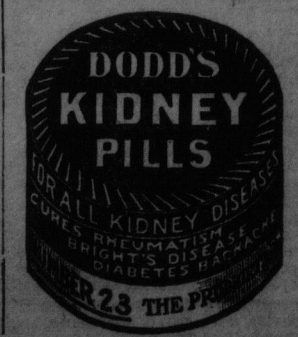

## TITANIC PAPERS WENT DOWN WITH LUSITANIA

New York, May 10.—The sinking of the Lusitania, echoed back to the loss of the Titanic today, when announcement was made in the federal court that notices sent to British claimants in the still pending Titanic litigation had been lost in the Lusitania's mail. The notices carried information that the trial of the proceedings for the limitation of liability brought by the Titanic's owners would be held on Monday next. It was indicated that the trial would now be postponed.
