Sporting Editor Standard.

Dear Sir,—A great deal of discussion is taking place at the present time in the Maritime Provinces in regard to the question of purity in amateur sport, and what is likely to happen if the present state of affairs is allowed to continue unchecked.

There seems to be two separate and distinct elements amongst the sport leaders in these parts, one of which is evidently out to smash the present organization and nearly all that it stands for. In my limited experience in sport matters in this section two things have forced themselves upon my attention, two things that bear directly upon the situation as it stands today.

One of these is the almost total lack of unity which is displayed at nearly all the gatherings of sporting men to discuss the affairs of sport. This seems to be so, not only in the Maritime organization but all well in various leagues and even individual clubs where trouble often arises and team or individual interests are advanced and upheld at the expense of the organization as a whole.

I have noticed this spirit on many occasions. It was displayed at the last annual meeting of the M. P. B. A. U. of C. in Lunenburg to a considerable extent. It is displayed at many league meetings on flimsy pretexts. This is a rank state of affairs and until it is remedied, until men get the bigger broader idea of the common good, of real brotherhood in sport, it is not likely we shall accomplish very much.

The other point I wished to mention was the careless indifference displayed in reference to the signing of the amateur form. It is clearly stated to just what constitutes an amateur and an athlete is more or less a honor when he signs it. This, however, does not seem to be considered in a lot of cases. According to the evidence available (and I have had a look at it), it is not a question of doing what is right and honorable, but how can I best work it to hold my amateur card and still get a little on the side.

No one suggests that to be a "pro" is anything but honorable. The crooked aspect looms up when the "pro" tries to masquerade as an amateur. This is the point of the whole present anti-doping.

President Covey has taken about the only course left open to him. A simple expedient it is, and one that will commend itself to every sportsman who has his record clear and no axe to grind. If we wish to uphold the old traditions of British sport, let us see to it that the present situation will end in the cleansing of sport down here by the sea no matter at what cost. It is idle to say that the situation is hopeless, that practically every athlete of any ability is contaminated. If that were so (and I very much doubt it, because we still have a lot of honorable athletes in spite of all this), even then the position is hopeful, because we have large numbers of young athletes who are just coming up and we can take care that this demoralizing influence that is abroad will be counteracted in no uncertain way. The surest and best way to clear the situation is to teach the coming generation of athletes that they must hold to the letter and spirit of the amateur definition, not only for their own sakes, which, after all, is the least important feature, but for the sake of the good name of the community and the nation as a whole.

FRANCE SEEING  
HERSELF AS SEEN  
BY MANY OTHERS

Her Editors Take a Peek Into  
World's Looking Glass—  
Find Americans Unfavorable.

Paris, Jan. 30.—There are certain evidences today that France, after doing some real hard thinking, is at last beginning to see herself as others see her.

While some political experts—Portinax, for example—insist that the present American attitude toward France, and therefore toward the Genoa Conference, is based on material considerations, there are others, notably Philippe Millet, foreign editor of Petit Parisien, who now make open confession that this "greatest European democracy" needs to cease fooling herself and immediately turn over a new leaf if she wishes to maintain the good will of other nations.

M. Millet, writing under the nom de plume of "Diplomate," says in yesterday's Paris Midi:

"It is only too clear that American opinion today is unfavorable to France. The situation is really worse than it appears. It is only the American Government that holds the reins of power and Congress in check and thus keeps the manifestations of displeasure less than they otherwise would be."

"It is perilous for us to be indignant about it. We must do much better to search for the cause. There is no mystery. We should guard ourselves against ridicule by not attributing the situation to any malicious campaign directed against our innocence. There is no plot."

"When the Washington Conference seemed under French suddenly presented a naval programme that not only appeared exorbitant but they also had more difficulty in pardoning us because we presented an obstacle in the final accord, especially as regards the tonnage of submarines."

"Since that day the most refractory Americans have believed us imperialists. It has been in vain that a small band of journalists have tried to rehabilitate us. We now pass for a race of honest people but without a political horizon, without generosity and without confidence in the future. At the moment the entire world desires to recommence business and live in peace, a legend has been created that France is an obstacle to universal welfare."

"This is somewhat our fault. In nearly all conferences we have had only a negative policy. Such will likely be the case at Genoa. Instead of fearlessly taking the lead in a democratic movement we continue to play the role of the recalcitrant schoolboy that needs his ears pinched."
