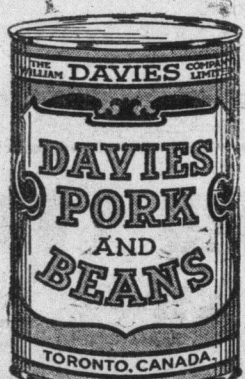

"Is advice ever taken? Especially when suns are so hot and woods so cool. Come, Vera, give me your blessing ere I depart this life, at all events, for regions unknown."

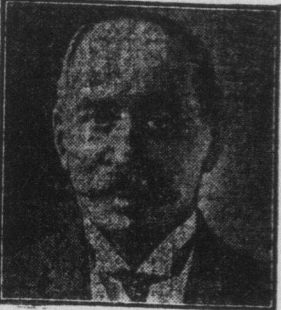
