
WORLD CHAMPIONS

For the sixth time in thirteen years Canada has won the World Junior Men's Championship in Fusson, West Germany. The team is made up of four UNB students; Jim Sullivan, Charlie Sullivan, Craig Burgess, and Dan Alderman. They went through the tournament with one loss which did not drop the team out of first place in the round robin.

The Sullivan rink beat Norway in the semi-finals to . In the other semi-final game, Sweden upset Switzerland. "I was surprised that Sweden beat Switzerland," said Jim Sullivan, "but we were prepared to play either team in the finals."

Ethical questions raised over funding.

Ethical questions about corporate involvement in the forthcoming Student Union elections have been raised by the Chief Returning Officer.

United '88, a self-styled political cooperative, received an undisclosed sum of money from Moosehead Breweries to help finance their campaign.

But the CRO feels that United's initiative is unethical. "There's nothing saying that they can't seek sponsorship from a company like Moosehead" said Tim Judah,

one of the deputy returning officers. "However," he added, "we think that it's bad practice for the university to condone this sort of thing. We've got to take a stand against it."

Dean Frost, the presidential candidate for United '88, explained that his team needed a sponsor to help finance a professional campaign.

"We wanted to do something about student apathy on campus, so we thought we'd organize a professional campaign," Frost said. "There's nothing in the by-laws saying that we couldn't find a sponsor."

However, the returning officers have invoked a clause in the election by-laws stating that the CRO can veto anything "which in the CRO's opinion biases without opportunity for fair reply or interferes with the election."

Following a meeting on Tuesday afternoon with Dean Frost, the returning officers explained that the free beer tokens circulating on campus last Friday by United '88 could give them an unfair advantage over the other candidates.
