The program of events at the Snowmobile Derby will have a total of \$3,500 in cash awards. The first of the 14 races will be at 10 a.m. Saturday. At the lunch break a special performance by the Red Nites will be held, followed by the Media race. In the after-noon the balance of the program will see three races plus qualifying sprints for the feature on Sunday

Sunday's program will start at 10.30 p.m. and will see three morning races, another performance by the Red Nites and then three more races before the big feature event at 3.30 p.m.
