Peel teams find Erindale college field too tough

fell to exceedingly tough competition in first round action of the Erindale College Christmas tournament Friday night.

The Brampton Centennial Bucs, last year's Peel-Halton champs, distinguished themselves the most of any local team in dropping a 47-33 match to Lourdes, a private Catholic high school from Rochester, Minnesota.

The Bucs shot impressivley from outside and worked the ball well for the open shot but they never solved Lourdes seemingly impenetrable zone defence. State champions of Minnesota last year, Lourdes was led by six-foot-five all-state centre Tom Wente who dominated on the defensive boards, blocked a half dozen shots and was able to score consistently from inside.

Brampton fell behind playing a man to man defence and when Bernie Niermann got in foul trouble they switched to a zone of their own which was very effective. They held Lourdes to six points in the third quarter of the amazingly deliberate contest.

Wente led Lourdes with 17 points. Niermann scored eight, guard Bruce Parkinson seven and center Dennis Zanardo six for Brampton. Forward Mike Dunn who replaced injured starter Warren Day for the Bucs also had a fine game

in other first round action, Toronto St. Mike's using their vaunted man-to-man defence beat the Erindale Raiders 58-44. Mike's guard Rob Pietrobon was outstanding for the winners scoring 21 points and displaying flawless shooting from the field. Nick Vojvodich had 12 for St. Mike's who played their second string

for the entire fourth quarter. "We were beaten by a very good ballclub," explained Coach Walt Jowett after the game. John Howard's 10 points paced the Raiders, who also got seven from Ron Bell.

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



'Several things occurred during the trip that caused our emotions to be battered and assailed," says Eagleson. The Russians refused to let the players and their wives stay in the same hotel or tour the Kremlin at the same time. The players' dressing room was locked when the Canadians arrived for the eighth game, the first time that had happened. "I was just sitting — burning

for 20 minutes," Eagleson says.

During the hectic first period penalty incident to Jean Paul Parise, Eagleson says he was still calm enough to go to the Canadian's bench and convince some players

and Coach John Ferguson that they shouldn't leave as they wanted to But then between the first and second periods, the wife of the Canadian ambassador to Russia, R.A. Ford, was pushed away by Russian police when she stepped on a red carpet reserved for players to

give Paul Henderson an en-couraging pat on the shoulder. Between the se and and third periods with Canada trailing 5-3 Eagleson had a chat with his Russian organizational counterpart. "I mentioned that I hoped we could score a couple of goals and the series would end in a tie. 'If it's a tie you lose because we scored more goals,' he said. In my typical loud raucous way I went into our dressing room and told the players a tie wasn't good enough to beat those Russian bastards. And that's just what I

called them.

When Esposito scored and the red light failed to go on Eagleson rushed out of his seat. "The cops took the opportunity to start punching me.' he says. There were 1,000 policemen, two deep surrounding the ice surface. "Their whole system is so related to strength, arms and muscle," he says.

Not to be outdone. Peter Mahovlich came to Eagleson's rescue, hitting a policeman over the shoulder with his stick in the process. Pat Stapleton speared another, Eagleson claims. "I would have been in the hospital, or in jail if not for Peter Mahovlich."
