

## The Cid.

The ancient Spanish and Portuguese war lyrics are called redondillas and romanceros. "The Chronicle of the Cid," written in the twelfth century, has been the military inspiration of the Spaniards for seven centuries. It has been deubted whether the Cid ever existed, but the researches of a Leyden prefessor prove that there was such person, though the Cid of history and the Cid of poetry are very dissimilar in character. The Cid of poetry and drama was the type of knightly virtue, "The Perfect, the Born in a Happy Hour, the Invincible, the Magnanimous." He is Roland and Bayard in one.

In the popular literature of Spain he holds a place without parallel in the history of any other hero. Sung by wandering bards in the twelfth ceutury, he is the inspiration of revolu-tionary songs and odes in the nine-teenth. More than 200 ballads relating to his deeds and prowess have been col lected. Most of these are of the sixteenth century. Some are much earlier and were transmitted orally from generation to generation. The dramas, poems and tales founded on the "Poems del Cid" are innumerable.-Lippin-

## "Criminal Type" Nonsense.

A few years ago most of us had coniderable faith in Lombroso's "criminal type." We looked at ear lobes and finger nails and thought we detected in them the "stigmata of degeneration."

Criminals are just like other people of their sex, age and condition in life. They are tempted, fall and are caught, especially the last, and that is the only difference.—Dr. Brinton in Science.

## TORONTO PRODUCE.

Toronto, Oct. 29.-Butter-There is nothing of note in the condition of the market. Creameries continues steady and in fair demand, though dairies are the most sought after at present. tinue heavy. Large dairy rolls sell at 16 cents, dairy tubs and pails bringing the same figure, if extremely choice 16 1-2c can be obtained. Poor grades sell at 12c to 15c, and difficult sale at that. The best dairy pound rolls are selling at 17c. The demand for cream-ery is steady and it sells at 18c (to20c, for solid and 21 to 21 1-2c for prints.

Eggs—Offerings are quite liberal, and the market is brisk. Prices are firm at 17c for the best stock and ordinary stock are quoted at 14 to 15c.

Poultry—The demand is strong for all classes, particularly for ducks, of which the offerings are light. Well that a turkeys also are scarce. Prices fatter turkeys also are scarce. Prices are about steady at 45c to 50c for choice dry-plucked stock, 35c to 50c. for scalded and 35c to 50c for live chickens. Turkeys are quoted at 8c to 9c for fresh killed, dry-plucked young birds, 11c to 12c for young gobblers and 9c to 10c, for old gobblers. Ducks sell at 65 to 70c per pair, and geese at 5c to


6c per lb.


