of victory.

Jap Aftempt Repulsed,
St. Petersburg, June 27.—Two telegrams were received yesterday by Emperor Nicholas from Lieut-Gen. Linevitch, dated June 24 and June 25, respectively, and referring to the movements of June 21 and June 22. On the latter date a Japanese attempt to dislodge the Russian outposts in the valley of the Kaite was repulsed while the Russians in the Pailungchen district dislodged the Japanese cutposts at Nanshancheng and advanced southward of that place. The Russions operating mear Ufangiu retired after unmasking many of the Japanese resumed the offensive near Shimiaots, continuing a frental attack and making an energette

London, June 27.—Questioned in the House of Commons yesterday regarding the destruction of British vessels by Russian auxiliary crulsers, Premier Balfour said the Russian Government disapproved of the actions of their cruisers, and that orders had been transmitted, rendering quite impossible any repetition of the last, which the British Government regarded as eutrages against international law.
