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LAYMEN are not to be accused save by certain legal accusers and witnesses, in the presence of the bishop. Failing such accusations, the sheriff shall cause twelve lawful men of the district to swear before the bishop that they will declare in that matter according to their conscience.—*The Constitutions of Clarendon, A.D., 1164. This being the first indication of Trial by Jury. They were renounced ten years later, and re-enacted at Northampton in 1176, which was one of the most important political gatherings in English History.*

NULLUS LIBER HOMO CAPIATUR, vel imprisonetur, aut utlagetur, aut exuletur, aut aliquo modo destruat; nec super eum ibimus, nec super eum mittimus nisi per legale iudicium parium suorum, vel per legem terre. NULLI VENDEMUS, NULLI NEGABIMUS, AUT DIFFEREMUS RECTUM AUT JUSTITIAM.

NO FREEMAN SHALL BE TAKEN OR IMPRISONED or disseised, or outlawed, or banished or any ways destroyed, nor will we pass upon him, nor will we send upon him, unless by the lawful judgment of his peers, or by the law of the land. WE WILL SELL TO NO MAN, WE WILL NOT DENY TO ANY MAN EITHER JUSTICE OR RIGHT.

Being the 39th and 40th clauses of Magna Charta, 15th June, 1215, which is on everybody's lips, but in nobody's head.

KING JOHN was a rascal, he was an able, vicious, treacherous, tyrannical, ungrateful, lustful brute. It was this conduct which gave rise to "MAGNA CHARTA," by the aid of which English History took the direction of securing constitutional liberty by Administrative Law. It asserted the rights and powers of Englishmen to be greater than the king. It systematized the scattered fragments of liberty, and it formed the first and greatest Public Act of Anglo-Saxons, Normans and Englishmen, who by it established their identity and their unity for all time to come.
