July 29th, 1915.
Dear Father and All—
I thought I would drop you a few lines, hoping they will find you all well, as this leaves me. I am having lots of work, but am fattening on it, so you see I must be all right so far. Well we are going to get six days' leave to England. I wish it was home, as I have not seen you for so long. Would give anything to have a chat with you now. Things are very lively here. I am thinking the war will last another winter, and that will mean a lot of extra work for us and will be a lot harder, but the Germans will have it harder, for we will keep them going, believe me. Well, father I don't hear from you very often, as the mail does not get through very quickly, somehow. When I get on leave I will send you some souvenirs, if possible. How are all the children? You must excuse this short letter for this time, as I am so busy that I am not able to write much, so will close now with love to all.

Death of Mrs. Benedict

The funeral took place on the 13th from her late residence, service being held in Carmel Church and interment in the cemetery adjoining.

What Happened to Cheese

Trade Bulletin
The chief cause of the demoralization of the market in England has been the accumulation of United States and Canadian imports, principally the former. The stocks of Canadian and States cheese in the Surrey Commercial docks, London, on July 9 were 145,214 boxes, as compared with 62,465 boxes on same date last year, and with about this comparison in the other English markets, one need not wonder at the recent decline in prices. The poor quality of the American cheese induced holders to rush them off at whatever prices they would fetch; and this had a sagging effect on the market; but as soon as they are worked off an improvement in the general tone of the market is expected.

J. W. Flavell's Beautiful Launch Was Burned

Today Mr. J. W. Flavell's magnificent launch "Swannanoa" is a total wreck, and the chauffeur, Jack Salisbury is lying badly burned in the Ross Memorial Hospital, as the result of an explosion and resulting in fire at Sturgeon Point, Saturday afternoon about one o'clock.

It seems that the chauffeur was about to take the launch to the upper wharf to meet Mr. J. W. Flavell, who was coming down from Toronto for the week end. Salisbury was in the boat house starting up the engine preparatory to backing out. It is said that he was leaning over into the engine hatch making an adjustment, when on account of a back-fire from the carburetor or other cause an explosion took place of the gasoline fumes accumulated in the engine compartment. Owing to shock the young man is not very clear on just how it occurred.

The whole forward end of the hull was split open and burst into flames. Salisbury was surrounded by fire. His arms were burned to the elbow, while his face was also burned. He lost his eyebrows and hair and his clothing was on fire. The flames from the boat were leaping as high as the ceiling of the boat house and in order to save it he cut all the ropes and then jumped into the water to extinguish his own clothing. His strength failing, he staggered up to the cottage for help.

Mr. J. W. Flavell heard the explosion and was just coming down when he saw Salisbury coming toward him, calling out to get help, that the boat had blown up and the boat house was catching fire.

The young man then collapsed. Mr. Flavell immediately called help and carried him to the house.

The launch was shoved out into the lake, and sand and water thrown on the flames, which were still in the forward end of the boat and particularly around the gasoline tank where the flames could not be extinguished.

Mr. J. W. Flavell arrived on the Wacouta, which on sighting the flames pulled up full speed and landed him at the nearest wharf.

On account of the danger of an explosion of the gasoline tank where the flames were hottest a rifle was obtained, and Mr. Flavell shot a couple of holes in the tank for the fuel to escape. The water for twenty feet around burst into flame from the film of gasoline. An effort was made to sink the boat so the engine and other parts would not be utterly ruined, but she grounded on the sandbar and it was some time before she could be gotten into deep water. Finally she sank with the charred stern still above water, which is all that can be seen of her. The chassis, top and other fittings were utterly destroyed.

The hull being submerged, the exact damage is not known but she is probably a total wreck.

The boat was valued at between three and four thousand dollars. She was beautifully fitted out in mahogany with other fittings in keeping. The insurance is very small so that it is practically a total loss.

Salisbury was brought to the Ross Memorial Hospital Sunday and is progressing favorably.—Lindsay Post.

Might Have Been Serious

What might have been a serious accident happened Saturday night when a horse, driven by a young man named Everett McCann, ran away. It succeeded in pitching him out and demolishing the rig, and also colliding with a rig in which were Mr. and Mrs. McMaster. The occupants of this carriage were also thrown out and their horse also ran away. Mr. McCann was reported as being considerably bruised about the head and face, but Mr. and Mrs. McMaster were, it appears, more fortunate in that they did not suffer any severe bodily injury. The run away occurred late at night on the Macos road just inside the village limits.—Stirling News-Argus.

SERGT. MAJOR MILLIGAN KILLED IN ACTION

First of Seven Soldier and Sailor
Brothers to Give Life for
Empire

Mr. J. Lewis Milligan of the Toronto Globe staff and formerly Methodist minister at Actonville (Bridgeview), Ont., on Monday evening received the sad news that his eldest brother, Sergt.-Major Caleb John Milligan of the South Lancashire Regiment had been killed in action. Sergt.-Major Milligan fell serving his King and country in the Cameroons on the west coast of Central Africa. He had previously served in Egypt and India and up till the outbreak of war was in Nigeria training native troops.

Sergt.-Major Milligan was the eldest of eight brothers, six of whom are still actively engaged in the Empire's service. He is the first of the family to fall. One brother, a member of the British Marines, was wounded in the siege of Antwerp, but recovered and is back on active service in the Dardanelles. Two other brothers are gunners in the British navy, one on duty in the North Sea, the other on the Mediterranean. Two others are members of the Territorials and are on active service with King's Own Rifles in Flanders. The youngest brother, Ben, is now in training with the Canadians at Niagara Camp, where he is Sergt.-Major of "D" Company of the 88th Battalion.

Prior to his appointment as police officer, he was a member of the Artillery at Kingston for three years. It is his intention to join the C. F. A. as his training has been all in the artillery branch of the service.

The removal of Constable Thompson from the police force will leave a vacancy in this department which will be difficult to fill. He has been a most successful officer, faithful in the discharge of his duty.

He has sent in his resignation to Chief Newton who has forwarded it to the police commissioners.

A FLAG INCIDENT IN PETERBORO'

A flag incident of rather ludicrous character broke the monotony of Charlotte street on Saturday evening. Mr. Augustus Schraeder wished to celebrate his birthday by a display of flags, on his residence, 246 1-2 Charlotte street. The day coming on Sunday he made ready on Saturday. Because in recognition of the amicable relations existing between the United States and this country, he included in his decorations rather a surplus of American flags, the loyal spirit of some persons was aroused and a demonstration made against the display. A police officer was an element in the prevention of any serious consequences. The offending flags were removed.

It is a pleasant thing to observe so much patriotism and loyalty displayed in behalf of the flag, in seeing that it is duly honored, but there is chance for the reminder that shouting for the flag is not all. At this time for war fighting for the flag takes first place, and it has been remarked that many of those so righteously indignant at the display of the United States flag are not in the fighting line for the good old British flag. This would be a much more becoming action and show more bravery than in making demands upon a harmless, inoffensive citizen, a native-born Canadian with peculiar ideas about the display of flags, but a good-living, honest, hard working man who has another peculiarity in that he minds his own business and harrus nobody.

L. B. Cooper is Grand Master

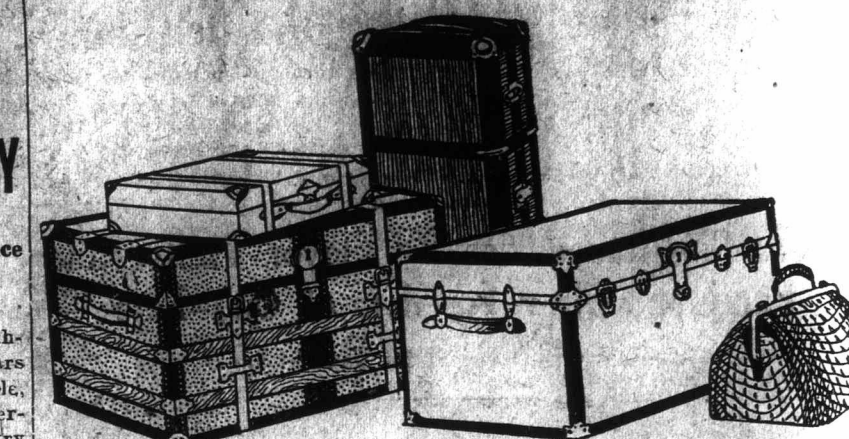
