# **Double Track Radial** Scheme Is Proposed

Important Plans By Brantford and Hamiltom Road --- Would Be Greatest Line in the Dominion.

It has been intimated in railway circles that the management of the Brantford & Hamilton radial are seriously considering the adisability of double-tracking their line between Brantford and Hamiton. The passenger and freight traffic has increased to such proportions that the company are handicapped with the single track system. In the fall of the year, when an immense quantity of fruit has to be handled, and handled quickly, the company could operate their system to a great advantage if they had a double track between Hamilton and the Telephone City. From what can be learned, the construction of another track between the points mentioned will be started in the spring. A double track would undoubtedly make the B. & H. the greatest of its kind in Canada.
