

BISHOP WILLIAMS VISITED CITY

Confirmation Services Were Held at Three Churches on Sunday.


Yesterday at St. John's Church, Bishop Williams of Huron College, conducted confirmation services. Basing his admonitory address on texts from Ephesians and Corinthians:

"And that ye put on the new man which after God is created in righteousness and holiness." "Having therefore these promises, dearly beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit—perfecting holiness in the fear of God."

"A new man. There were three conceptions of holy writ on this. Of man created; of man renewed in Divine Creation; and man risen from the dead. These spiritual truths are the mainspring of all the moving spirit of the Revival in the 18th Century, they are the light of modern forward work. There is renaissance for mankind in this, that Divine life is rooted in God not in self. From that Supreme source came these stirrings in men's souls that urge them onwards in purity and spirituality. He is the mainspring—man's effort effort the result of communion with the Spirit of Life, which is God.

"Man renewed into the knowledge after the image of Him, who created. He who rose from the dead was renewed in Divine Creation, materially, as well as spiritually. This is no mechanical action by a stationary

The technical question of whether passports for the members of the commission appointed to examine the body of William S. erection—for whatsoever God creates he must also sustain. A great artist may paint a picture which will be immortal—but the man whose art resulted in the canvas that we gaze on does not live on—he is not essential to the immortality of his work. A great poem may live through the ages after its author has been well nigh forgotten—the difference between man's creation and the Divine is that man's work can last without him, but the world around cannot without He who was the Great Architect and Builder of the Universe; the artist whose genius planned our broad lands and lovely scenes—His spirit must animate it or they vanish forever.

"Should He withdraw His presence all life would fade. We arise with daylight, it is His touch. But if we withdraw when amid life's business from that communion, essential to spiritual life—if we forget the daily prayers and meditation on ourselves—we are losing touch with the power from whence all life flows.

Therein is a symbol for our Confirmation to-day—ye who partake must partake in the Spirit, contribute and eager for new life in Him—a renewal of the Divinity within you.

Having therefore these promises, let us cleanse ourselves. Note the Apostle did not say Laws—but promises—then the power to do is ours. The physical functions of life, we eat, exercise and maintain in good order—it is just as necessary that we maintain the functions of the spiritual life. Life is a gift from God—He renews it day by day if we neglect the wise use of the Powers we are en-

dowed with, it means atrophy. We must exert the spark within us—when we do, then the work in which this Force results is our work. God will fill his part; He shall sustain; His strong arm will ever be about you. His Grace will help when the fierce tempests of the soul are nigh—His love shall abound around your life forever. You must translate that Spirit into life within you, realizing the All Wise and His works on earth perfecting holiness in the fear of God."

Search out yourself—find out the blot on your soul—strive against delinquency and leave fear behind you, assured He created an ideal man and can sustain him, perfected in Holiness.

The inspirational hymn "Come Holy Ghost inspire our souls," followed. There were nine persons for Confirmation and the scene as the words: "Defend Oh Lord, this thy child, with Thy Heavenly Grace, that he may continue Thine forever; and daily increase in Thy Holy Spirit more and more, until he comes unto Thy everlasting Kingdom—Amen."

As the Bishop gave the solemn dedication to the Church of God, his deep toned reverent voice, and fine manly presence, gave to his hearers a deeper and more thoughtful conception of duty and service in Christian life.

Confirmation services were also conducted at St. Luke's and Trinity Churches.

SYDENHAM ST. METHODIST. Yesterday morning at Sydenham St. Methodist Mr. William Clark, of the Social and Moral Reform Department of the Methodist church, gave a most inspiring address to parents.

He took up life of a boy and girl and told plainly and no unimpeachable way the errors parents were making in not teaching and looking after their children. The talk was distinctly practical and suggestive. He also spoke to young men in the afternoon.

There were 40,000 people in the jails of Canada and 90 per cent. of them were there through some form of stealing. He contended the attitude of those who stood on both sides of the counter and handled money-grasping corporations who think nothing but dividends and profits and grind and cut their employees for the purpose of hoarding up their millions or less. It was said that a corporation had no soul, but the speaker insisted that God knew and a reckoning was coming for them. It was one of the best sermons of the series. The music for the day was good and the attendances splendid.
