SHACKLETON HAS ARRIVED AT THE FALKLAND ISLES

Famous Explorer Announces He Got Safely Out of the Ice.

London, June 1.—Lieutenant Sir Ernest Shackleton, the Antarctic explorer, has arrived at Port Stanley, Falkland Islands.

The news that Lieut. Shackleton was safe reached London shortly after midnight. The message was from the explorer himself, and announced his arrival at Port Stanley.

The message said his ship, the Endurance, had been "crushed" in a Weddell Sea ice floe last October, but that it drifted until Midwinter, when he and his party landed on Elephant Island in the South Shetland group.

The explorer left in a small boat with five men a week later to sum up help, leaving 22 men behind. All of them were well, but in a situation which demands the quickest possible relief.

The message from Lieut. Shackleton was dated Port Stanley, May 31. It said that he left Elephant Island April 24.

The gravest fears had been entertained for the explorer during the past two weeks owing to the absence of news from the Endurance, and in the House of Commons yesterday Premier Asquith said that the Government had approved of a committee appointed by the Admiralty to give advice regarding a relief expedition.

The news of the safety of Sir Ernest and the small party with him has not lessened the necessity for relief, which is even more pressing now on behalf of the men left behind in the ice on Elephant Island, probably by scantily provided with provisions and other necessities, as well as in behalf of the Ross Sea party, which was stranded on the great barrier through the breaking away of the relief ship Aurora, which returned to New Zealand early in the year.

Coro Tracy will be the Alan-a-Dale and her rich contralto adds a new beauty to Mr. de Koven's best known comic, "O, Promise Me." Another reason for the Grand Opera is James Stevens of the Chicago Opera Company whose singing of "Brown October Ale" gives a pleasure only possible from such a splendid baritone voice.

Herbert Waterous, a fine basso, will sing the famous "Armourers' Song." Marie McConnell, Tillie Salinger, Phil Branson and Sol Solomon complete the cast, the excellence of which has never been surpassed, if equalled in comic opera. An exceptional singing chorus carried by the company is of the highest order. Special mention is made of the vocal merit of this company, in justice to the charm of Reginald de Koven's music.

This elaborate production, which is under the direction of Fred E. Walker, is the same as that given at the New Amsterdam Theatre, New York, during the long run of "Robin Hood" in that city last year.

The performance here will undoubtedly be the social and musical event of the season.

ROOSEVELT IS ENDOSED BY BANK PRESIDENT

Frank A. Vanderlip, Former Opponent, Now in His Favor.

New York, June 1.—Frank A. Vanderlip, president of the National City Bank, said yesterday that he favored the nomination and election of Colonel Roosevelt for another term, in the Chicago convention.

"I am for him," said Mr. Vanderlip, "and you can say so if you want to. I will admit that I did not favor him a few months ago. Mr. Roosevelt's voice in plain language his stand on the most important principles that there is no mistaking his attitude.

"The necessity for preparedness on the part of the United States overshadows all else. Mr. Roosevelt's utterances on important business questions have been, on the whole, satisfactory though I take issue with him on one or two. But what use is business, if this country is going to remain open to invasion? There has been a great swing to Roosevelt lately among the plain people. I think he will be elected."

WAR COMMITTEE READY FOR WORK

Sir John Hendrie Elected Chairman and Hon. Mr. Hearst Vice-Chairman.

Toronto, June 1.—The special committee of the Legislature appointed last session to study means of better organizing Ontario resources for the prosecution of the war met at the Parliament Buildings yesterday. The committee did little more than map out preliminary work and will settle down to the problem at hand on Friday morning next when representative employers and labor men and military men conversant with recruiting needs will appear before the members to exchange views.

The committee will commence the preparation of data on all the matters coming within the scope of the committee's work—the cost to Ontario of the war to date, and the estimated cost during the continuation of the war, the agricultural possibilities of the province, the remaining supply of men of military age and the existing contingents.

The committee upon the motion of Hon. Mr. Hearst, elected the Lieutenant-Governor, Sir John Hendrie permanent chairman. The Prime Minister was elected vice-chairman and Dr. A. H. Abbott secretary.

In a statement after the committee rose, Hon Mr Hearst emphasized the fact that the war committee was not seeking to usurp the functions of any of the existing organizations, but rather to co-operate with them or to occupy any field that has not yet been occupied.
