Pueblos and the Compass. Among the Pueblo Indians six points of the compass are recognized, and each has its color. North is yellow, west is blue, south is red, east is white, the upper regions are many colored and the lower regions are black.

For example, there is the yellow nountain lion of the north, the blue nountain lion of the west, the red mountain of the south, and so on. Likewise it is with the other beasts and thus a very considerable number of deities is formed. All of them mus receive worshipful attention lest they get angry and revenge themselves for

Where Amber Is Found. The largest quantity of amber is found on the southern shore of the Baltic between Memel and Konigsberg, where it is cast up by the action of the ground swell after the northerty gales. It is also found on the coas of Sicily, on the shores of the Adriatic, on the English beach of Norfolk and Suffolk and at Cape Sable in Maryland. Mining for amber in beds of brown lignite or wood coal is carried on in Prussia, and it is found in excavations all over Europe.

HEAVY RAINS.

To the Editor of The Planet: In Monday's paper it is stated that 2,056 tons of rain fell per acre on Saturday. Did you get the statement from some of our fishermen? 2,056 tons to the acre would mean a rainfall of over 18 inches of water on the level. There are 43,560 square feet in an acre, which is 3,630 cubic feet; rain water weighs 62 1-2 lbs. to the cubic foot; then 3,630 cubic feet weighs 226,-270 lbs., which, at 2,000 lbs. to the ton, gives 113 tons to the acre. Then 2,056 tons is equal to a little over 18 inches depth of water all over this section.
