The Americans, however, are the ones who have shown that they are willing to stake the necessary chance, and unless others do this, they cannot hope to reap the rewards.

There has been no organized effort on the part of the people here, however, to advertise the field, and as a result there are many Canadians who look with indifference upon this important oil region.
