Town Council Meeting.

The monthly meeting of the town council, adjourned from Jan. 1st, was held on Tuesday evening of this week.

Reports were read from School Board, Water Com., Poor Com., Street Com. The following bills were read and ordered paid:

F. J. Porter (poor supplies) \$5.00 (Fire building) 4.03 Jas. M. Tava (expenses) 1.70 Town Clerk (postages) 3.50 Acadia Edison Electric Co., 39.37

Resolved that the clerk be instructed to have insurance on Fire Building and contents, expiring Jan. 11th, renewed at best possible rates.

Resolved that J. J. Richie, with bill of expenses re Scott Act prosecutions, amounting to \$40.00, was read and referred to Mr. Wolfe for approval.

Resolved that Couns. Davison, Thomson and Saxer be a com. to make a contract with the Acadia Edison Electric Co., on the most favorable possible terms for street lighting for the coming year.

Resolved that J. W. Wallace be presiding officer and F. A. Dixon polling clerk for the approaching election.

Clerk was instructed to advertise for tenders for the approaching election.

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Long Island.

The annual social reunion of the inhabitants of Long Island, Grand Pre, was held in the church on the evening of Thursday, the 3rd inst.

After the good things for the inner man were amply discussed, the chair was taken by Mr. Leander Palmeter, the senior member of the community, at whose request Mr. Councillor Curry, of Horton Landing, in his usual pleasing manner, read the following address:

To Mrs J. Eranit Palmeter. We the congregation of Long Island church, as a token of our good will and in appreciation of your kind services as organist for the past few years, desire to present you with our best wishes and kindest regards, this chair, hoping that the New Year may be a very happy one to you and yours, and that the harmony existing between the organist, choir and people may grow stronger as the years go by, and that you may live many years to enjoy the good-looking of the choir.

Mrs Palmeter, who was completely taken by surprise, replied in a few well chosen words.

The audience was entertained with speeches from the chairman, Councillor Curry and Dr. Chipman together with music till 10 o'clock, when it was announced that while others had been enjoying themselves some of the ladies were busy in preparing another surprise which appeared in the shape of a remarkably tasty oyster stew, which made those present almost regret that the ladies had succeeded so well at tea time.

About 11 p. m. the company broke up after singing "God be with you till we meet again." Much regret was expressed at the absence, through illness, of the Rev. Wm. Brown, who has been conducting services regularly since he came to Lower Horton.

During the year there have been among the people two marriages and one death, the latter being that of Mr B. F. Ward, who at the time of his decease was the oldest person resident on the Island.

Mr Emerson intends to put in more machinery next summer, which will make it better for the working class of this locality. Messrs Fullerton are business men and are a great benefit to the families of Vesuvius.

Frank Spinney and Clem Pick, teamsters of Fullerton's firm, got their oxen hurt while hauling logs last week, which laid them up for a few days. They were working for Schoffil and Nowlin.

Killed by the Train. FATAL ACCIDENT AT SOUTHBORO, MASS., -MAN AND BOY KILLED.

Mr Charles Schoffil, son of Alonzo and Matilda Schoffil, while driving a milk-team for A. D. Howe, of Southboro, Mass., was run into and killed by the express. Both horses were killed and Charles was torn to pieces. His remains were picked up 300 feet from where the train struck him. An 8 year old boy, Albert O'Leary, son of Robert O'Leary, who was with Mr Schoffil, was not killed outright but had his leg and arm broken and skull cracked, and died in the hospital same night. The boy's parents belong at White Rock Mills, N. S. Com.

According to New York papers all that remains apparently of the once great Talmage tabernacle, Brooklyn, is the Sabbath school which meets in the Centennial Baptist church, of which Rev. Sidney Wetton is pastor. This church it is stated, is as prosperous and doing as good work as at any time in its history. In 1895 there will be five eclipses, three of the sun and two of the moon. The eclipses of the sun are invisible in this latitude, with the exception that the first, on March 25, will be seen for a short time, the sun rising eclipsed. The others are partial eclipses totally invisible here, one August 20th, and one on Aug. 18th.
