The Gordon-McKay building has been purchased by the Massey-Harris Company Limited and will be occupied by them early in the Spring. This announcement comes as a result of the negotiations between the company and President P. A. Kennedy of the Board of Trade, and an agreement has now been made between the Massey-Harris people and the Gordon-McKay Company which is entirely satisfactory to all parties concerne. The purchase price is \$130,000, with an additional \$10,000 being given for adjoining property to be used for storage purposes.

The successful outcome of the sale of the Gordon-Mckay building is due to the efforts of President P. A. Kennedy and the work of other Board of Trade officials in meeting some of the officials of the Massey-Harris Company. When President Kennedy was in the East last Summer he spent nearly two full weeks of his holidays in placing this and other propositions before Eastern firms, and as a result negotiations were entered into which eventually brought the Massey-Harris A delegation from the Board of Trade also visited one of the directors of the Massey-Harris company in Winnipeg last Summer and presented the proposition in a favorable light to him.

... The coming of the Massey-Harris Company to Brandon will mean the employment of some sixty people at their office and warehouse in the Gordon-McKay building. The Brandon warehouse will be used as a distributing centre for the firm's machin-
