Brandon Pioneer Has Passed Away

Mrs. Joseph Quinn Had an "Interesting Life Here During the Early Days

In the early hours of this morning there passed away at 114 Fifth street, one of the best known and most highly respected of Brandon's old citizens in the person of Mrs. Catherine Phillips, Denver, Quinn. She was the wife of Mr. Joseph Quinn, whose devoted helpmate she had been for 47 years.

As a good wife and mother, and as a sincere friend in a large circle of acquaintances shw will be keenly missed. Her Says Land in This Region Can quiet and retiring disposition tended to make her seek the society and happiness of her own family rather than the society of the world at large.

For twenty-five years she had attended to the interests of her husband's business. and it was only about two years ago that she gave up regular work in connection with it. Her health failed for some time, and for some months she had been suffering patiently, the progress of disease latterly being very painful. Quiet, patient cheerfulness, hoewver, had always been one of her characteristics.

Mrs. Joesph Quinn was the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Denver of County Down, Ireland, and was born at Drogheda in 1837, her father and mother dying during the epidemic of 1849. The young family they left were scattered among relatives.

On growing up she accepted a situation as companion to Mrs. Hawkins, wife of Rev. Mr. Hawkins, who was chaplin to the forces at Peshawar, India.
