MR. ALLISON Conservatory has a good musical library. It is especially well stocked with biographical works. This is fortunate, for the lives of many of the great musicians, normal romances, and are full of instructive incident.

MR. Landon, the Director, gave the music pupils an explanation of how music is taught to the blind, as a prelude to his lecture on the 4th.

Several of the musical people of the village avail themselves of the instruction given at these interesting lectures.

Miss Nettie Thomas the fourth lady student of the Senior class has returned somewhat unexpectedly. The class now numbers eighteen.

WORTHY or GREAT APPRECIATION.—The singing of the choir of Sackville Methodist church quite won the hearts of the scientists last June and Prof. Landon the new conservatory director is equally full of admiration for it. On the singing of Mrs. Harrison he comments as follows:—The congregation of the Methodist church of our village enjoys rare and great privilege in the superb voices and singing of Mrs. Harrison. On Sunday morning (Oct. 8th) she gave a remarkable interpretation of the great aria, "I will Extol Thee, O Lord," from "Eli" an oratorio by Michael Costa. This aria is a tone picture of the jubilant outburst of Hannah when giving her Lord exultant thanks from a heart overflowing with gratitude for the child Samuel which she was presenting to the temple service of her God Jehovah. Every phrase breathes forth her love and thankfulness for her son's happiest joy. The fine voice of Mrs. Harrison guided by an intelligence which gave a lively imaginative picture of the text of the scene together with her soulful and brilliant interpretation, especially in the ecstatic climax of the aria, made a powerful impression, which the great appreciation of her hearers will long remember. It is a piece of rare good fortune to the students of the conservatory, school of theology and for students of the other department of the university that they can weekly hear such fine singing. The models heard will be of practical value to them in the future, as well as to them in the act of intelligent listening, and so fit them for enjoying concerts by the great choral and gatorio societies that they may in the future chance to hear. Mrs. Harrison has the rare and delightful accomplishment of being able to enunciate clearly. The text of her songs is easily understood as it would be if recited by an elocutionist. This in sacred solo singing is a marked help in its tendency to an intelligent education of a singer's audience.
