SAY SEPARATIST MOVE HAS FAILED

Berlin, Oct. 25.—The conference of federal premiers last night adopted a statement declaring unanimous support of the Central government's standpoint in its dispute with Bavaria. The attempt to establish a Rhenish republic has failed according to the Berlin newspapers, whose despatches represent the Separatists as having been expelled or voluntarily withdrawn from almost all towns over which their flag has been hoisted.

SNEEZING SEASON STRIKES NEW YORK

New York, Oct. 24.—The sneezing season has arrived. Pollen has blown into New York from all directions and the city has hidden behind its handkerchief.

Dr. M. A. Ramirez, of the French Hospital, where a hay fever clinic has been established, said nothing could be done permanently to cure a sufferer of the noisily ailment.

"Hay fever is nothing to be sneezed at," he declared. "We can immobilize a patient to afford relief for one reason, but first we have to discover what particular thing it is which causes each one to sneeze."

"There was one lady who noticed she sneezed every time she looked at the Sunday paper. We made a serum from the picture sections of three papers and injected it. She was immediately relieved."

Cats, dogs and horses are also possible causes, he said, as well as certain foods. The sneezing churning will continue until the arrival of frost, though there may be intermissions caused by rainy periods. That's what the sneezers are hoping for.

CUSTODY OF BOY INVOLVED IN SUIT

Boston, Oct. 24.—Custody of a ten-year-old boy whose mother died in Ottawa two years ago is involved in a petition which has just been filed in the probate court. The boy, son of Bruce S. Evans, Jr., an insurance broker of this city, who is well known as an amateur golfer, is the beneficiary of a \$150,000 trust fund under the will of Mrs. Evans' father, Wm. H. A. Fraser, of Ottawa.

After Mrs. Evans' death the probate court named Evans as guardian of his son, who, however, has since lived in Canada in the homes of his grandfather and of Mrs. Armstrong, another daughter of Fraser. Alexander Fraser Chamberlain, one of the executors of Fraser's will, has asked the court to give the custody of the boy to Mrs. Armstrong, who was the principal beneficiary under Fraser's will.

Victor J. Loring, counsel for Chamberlain, explained that the bequest to the boy was revoked under the terms of the will if his custody went to any person unsatisfactory to the executors. He charged that Evans wished to retain his guardianship because of the money which eventually would come to him.

Amos U. Taylor, counsel for Evans, asserted that Evans' love for his boy had "no monetary value" and that he would not "sell out."
