his loved ones in eternity. Wrecking in Canadian Waters. The following is a copy of the circular issued by the Department of Customs in re-lation to wrecking in Canadian waters. Mr. Stephenson, of Kent, has been unre-mitting in his efforts on this subject, and to him is largely due the issue of the order :--

" CUSTOMS' DEPARTMENT, " OTTAWA, Ont., 8th March, '78.

"SIE,--I am now instructed by the Minister ( Oustoms to call your attention to the bearing of the Customs law upon the treatment of wrecked vessel or property in Canadian waters, which provides i effect, that no vessel, foreign or Canadian, has legal right to interfere with wrecked vessels or ms terial in Canadian waters, unless permitted by the Collector of Customs at the nearest port, after re porting to him. And no foreign vessel should re ceive such permission, as it is contrary to the Cus toms law, and should be placed under detention in case of violation. The coal own-ers' association of Yorkshire and South Derbyshire have resolved to reduce wages seven and a half per cent. The men are willing to accept a five per cont. reduction, but will not consent to more. The measters in the North of England iron trade are also demanding a reduction in wages from ten to seventeen per cent, to which a general resistance is being organized. King Humbert has opened the Italian Parliament in person. In his Speech he said the experience of recent ware necessitated the army and navy being newly equipped with arms. Italy unhesi-tatingly assented to the Conference, desir-ing to secure a durable peace for Europe, and her impartiality would give greater value to her counsels. His Majesty's speech concludes by referring in a very non-committal manner to the death of Plus IX and the election of his successor.
