Hughes Fights Labor Unions

Australian Premier Orders Banks to Pay No Money to Strikers—An Upheaval is Looked For.

SYDNEY, Australia, Feb. 14.—The Federal Government has intervened dramatically, in the engineers' strike Premier Hughes has forbidden banks to make any payments to the strikers or their unions, or to honor their securities, and this has caused a sensation in both camps. The trades unionists are greatly perturbed, because the engineers were not permitted to draw upon their bank accounts in the savings banks yesterday.

While the unions are outwardly inactive, there are evidences of tremendous underground activity, and efforts to obtain concerted action in a fight upon the Government. In consequence of the danger of a general upheaval the prices of foodstuffs are advancing sharply.

that this Council without desiring to be discourteous to the Hon. Mr. Rollo is of opinion that all matters relating to the city fire department are within the sole control of the Council and it is unnecessary for the Council to deal with as may be necessary and it is unnecessary in connection with the settlement of the present matters relating to the department and the employees thereof other authorities or bodies to address the Council, or in any way

Avery explained that he had consulted Mayor Lovell and Ald. Murphy before extending the invitation to Hon. Mr. Rollo. It was an embarrassing situation. Mr. Rollo felt his position keenly. After the meeting he told the members he had not come to address the Council as he knew that would be unparliamentary, but he thought he might do something to straighten matters in conference with a committee. He supposed when Ald. Ruff asked him to come over that was the wish of the City Council. He said the last thing he would think of was to interfere in any local matter.
