and a half high and is of birch tinted with cherry. The Communion rail is of cherry, birch and white wood. The Bishop's throne and the pulpit are of the same kinds of wood. The pews are in oak, ash and elm. The church is all plastered from floor to ridge, and is painted in stone green, antique ivory and lavender. The church has a seating capacity of about 1.500.

The contractor for the interior finish is Mr. Bernard Oreamer. For the marble work, the contractor was Mr. Regali of Quebec, and with him was associated Mr. Nocenti of New York, under whose supervision the work was done. The painter is Mr. Joseph McInnis, of Charlottetown, and the foreman of the work. and the foreman of the wood work is Mr. Joseph Oreamer. The work was carried on under the supervision of Mr. Laberge of Quebec, architect, representing Mr. Burlinget. The church when finished, will cost upwards of \$200,000.

The above description will convey to the minds of our readers some general idea of the magnificent temple solemnly, dedicated to divine service, on Thursday last by his Lordship, Bishop McDonald. A few minutes before ten o'clock the officiating Bishop and his lassistant riests, as well as all the visiting shops and clergy, moved in proession from the episcopal palace to the church, emerging from the front entrance on Great George street, and proceeding along the ast named street to the grand enrance of the Cathedral. Arriving there, his Lordship at once commenced the dedicatory ceremonies.
