Messages Received Previous to 9 A. M.

JAPAN RECEIVED NO PROPOSI-

TOKIO, March 2. Japan received no proposition from either Mexico or Germany directly or indirectly to join in possible war

against the United States. Viscoun Motone, Japanese Foreign Minister in formed the Associated Press to-day. Viscount Motone said he considere such an idea ridiculous, it being based on the outrageous presumption that Japan would abandon her allies If Mexico received the proposal, Viscount Motone added, the country showed injustice in not transmitting it to Japan.

NEW YORK, March 2. British troops made additional progress north and south of the Ancre but the statement from the Lond War Office gives no details of the la test advance northwest of Puisie the region of Warlencourt, south of the Ancre and towards Bapaum were the scenes of the latest gains The Germans apparently are prepar ing to make a stand in their presen line south of Bapaume as the Britis statement reports a repulse of attacks against British advanced positions near Gueudecourt and Ligny. A cor respondent of the Associated Press with the British armies reports the Germans are now making a definite stand on a line running from Essarts through Achiet-le-Petit to the south east of Bapaume.
